Ditto, Jan. 28, The Marcfchal d' Hamieres having drawn 8000 Men together, marched with then on Fuefday laft towards Soignies, and after having reposed his Men there, caufed them to attack two Cattles called Efcoffines, and la Folie, fituate between Soignies and Niwelle; the Soldiers that were Garifon'd in la Folie, looking upon themfelves unable to defend it, quitted it, and retired into Escoffines, which held out 48 hours, feveral of the French having been killed before it, and then the Befieged, who were not above 50 ftrong, furrendred ; and this afternoon we have advice that the Fiench have fighted both those Cafiles, and are marched on fome other defign, having thereby opened the Communication between Aeth and Charle of, which was before inter-rupted. The Duke d' Aerfchot, Governor of Mone, upon the first advice he had of the Enemies intention, fent 50 Men with fome Ammunicion to reinforce those Garifons, but the Enemy being already before the places, they were forced to return again. And from Lisge they write, of the 25 inftant, that a ftrong Party was drawn our of the Citadel of Liege, which had joined with fome Troops of Maestri, bt, and made together 4000 Men, having with them feveral pieces of Cannon, and that it was believed they had orders to attack the Caftle of Hcer, between Liege and Sc. Tron, into which the Dutch have lately put a Garifon ; that the French have taken the Caffle of Hamael, fituate about two Leagues from Tongres, to hinder the incursions of the Dutch at Haffel; though fome are ready to beli ve that thefe motions of the French in the Countrey of Liege, are only to entertain the Dutch, and keep them from affilling us against the Mareschal d' Humieres, whose designs are the more feared, for that the Governor of Leeuwe has fent to acquaint his Excellency, that the French are drawing a great many Troops together out of their Garilons on the Meufe, to join the faid Marefchal, whole intention, fome (ay, is only to conduct a great Convoy to Liege and Marftricht. Our Governor has fent orders to the Cavalry quartered in Brabant towards the Countrey of Liege, to draw together and join the Dutch of Haffel, to fee if they can attempt any thing upon the Enemy. Amidst these Alarms on that side it is feared the Marquis de Chamilly may put his defign in execution upon the Countrey of Wass, though all imaginable care is taken for its fecurity.

Hague, Jan. 28. The Bishop of Ofnabrug hath been fome dayes incognito at the Princes Houfe in the Wood, and having concluded the Treaty he had in hand with Spain and this State, by which he obliges himfelf to act with a Body of 8 or 9000 Men this Campagne by way of diversion, is returned home again. From Sueden we have the confirmation of the conclusion of the Treaty of Commerce between that Crown and this State, which is thought may be a great step to a Peace. From Liege they write, that the Dutch Troops had possified themfelves of the Cafile of Heers, where all the Countrey people of the Neighborhood had steltered a vass quantity of Corn, Cattle, Provisions, and the best of their Goods. according to the Capitulation. Paris, Jan. 25. The 15 inflant, his Excellency ry Lord Berkeley, Ambaffador Extraordinary of His Majefty of Green Bitain, made his publick Entry into this City, with the ulual Ceremonies, accompanied with the Duke of Luxemburgh, and the Sieur de Buevul, Introductor of Ambaffadors, who had been to receive him with the Kings Coaches at Rambouiller, and conducted him to the Houfe appointed for the Reception of all Ambaffadors, being followed with a numerous Train of Coaches, Arriving there, his Excellency was Complimented in the name of the King by the Duke de Criqui, by the Count de Monignas on the part of the Queen, and by the Coust de Pleffys and the Marquis de Bror, in the name of the Duke and Dutchels of Or-leans. The 17, his excellency was conduced to his faift pub-lick Audiences of their Majeflies, with the feveral Respects and Ceremonies that are ufually practifed on fuch occasions. From Alfatia they write, that the new Fortifications which are making at Saverne, Haguenaw and Schliftadt, advance apace ; that at this latter place there are conflantly 4000 men at work 5 that the other preparations for the next Campagne are v ry ex-traordinary, and in great forwardnefs; that the French Com-miffaries have bought up a great quantity of Horfes in Suiffer-land, not without giving the Spanish Ambasilador with the Cantons occasion to complain thereof Our Letters from Nancy of the 18 inftant, tell us, That the 4th inftant, the Count de Choifent, Mareschal de Camp, parted from thence, causing at the fame time a report to be fpread abroad, that he went to vifit and change the Garifons of feveral places, the better to cover the defign he had upon the City of Deax Ponts, fortified with a very good Wall, and with two deep Ditches full of Water. He very good wail, and with two deep Diches with of verses, foo took his way to Sarbruke, and arrived there the 91b with 500 Horfe, 150 Dragoons, and 1200 Foot, which he had drawn to-gether in his march. The 11, about 3 in the morning, he par-ted with these Troops from Sarbruke, having with him two pieces of Cannon, and 30 Wagons laden with Ammunitions, and after a march of 10 hours, arrived before the City of Dena Ponts; he caufed his Cannon to be feveral times difcharged againft the place, and thofe within during the whole night made the fame return with their Artillery. The next morning the Count de Choifent approached nearer to the Town, afterwards his Troops passed the River, and under the Covert of certain Houfes, advanced to opportunely, that they were come to the first Ditch, before discovered : at hich the Inhabitants and Soldiers in Garison there were so furprized, that they immediately delivered up the place, of which our Troops possessed themfelves without any loss, opening thereby a free passage to Philipiburgh. The Marquis de la Frislinee, Lieutenant General of the Artillery, commanded in this Expedicion under the Marquis de Choisinl.
