*Aranjuez, April 14.*

**H**IS Catholic Majesty has appointed Count d'Aranda President of Castile, an Employment of very great Consequence, and also Captain-General of the Kingdom of Toledo, and Governor of Madrid. The War Department had been given some Days before to Don Gregorio de Munian, a Lieutenant-General in this Service, and Governor of Badajoz.

*Dresden, April 27.* Count Palfi, who came hither to give an Account of the Celebration of the Marriage between Prince Albert of Saxony and the Archduchess Christina, took his Leave of this Court on Thursday Morning last. The Prince Administrator, at his Departure, presented him with a Diamond Ring of Two Thousand Dollars Value: And M. Lebenau, Chambellan to the Elector, was dispatched the following Day to Vienna; to return the Compliment.

*Hamburg, April 29.* On Saturday last Baron Schimmelmann, his Danish Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary in the Circle of Lower Saxony, arrived here from Copenhagen.

*Hague, May 2.* The Regiments in Garrison in this Town passed in Review this Morning before the Prince of Orange, and made a very fine Appearance.

The King has been pleased to appoint William Hewitt, Esq; to be one of the Commissioners for the Sale and Disposal of Lands in the Islands of Granada, the Grenadines, &c. in the Room of Hugh Grame, Esq; deceased.
