WHEREAS John Hoskins, of the
Parish of Seaton and Beer in the
County of Devon, Labourer, Ro-
bert Bools, of the said Parish of
Seaton and Beer in the said County, Labourer,
Joseph Bartlett, of the said Parish of Seaton and
Beer in the said County, Labourer, and Tho-
mas Rew, of the Parish of Heavitree in the said
County, Blacksmith, were, upon the Twenty-
fifth Day of March last, charged, by Informa-
tion of credible Persons upon Oath, by them
subscribed, before James Carrington, Clerk, one
of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the
County of Devon, with having been guilty, on
or about the Twenty-seventh Day of February
last, of being, together with diverse other Per-
sons, armed with Bludgeons, loaded Whips,
and other offensive Weapons, and, so armed,
being assembled near a Place called Countess
Wear in the Parish of Topsham in the said
County of Devon, in order to be aiding and
assisting in the carrying away uncustomed Goods.
—Which Information was afterwards certified
by the said James Carrington, under his Hand
and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Se-
cretaries of State, who has laid the same before
His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to
the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth
Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King
George the Second, in that Case made and pro-
vided.—His Majesty doth, by and with the Ad-
vice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in
His Privy Council, require and command that
the said John Hoskins, Robert Bools, Joseph
Bartlett, and Thomas Rew, and each of them,
do surrender himself and themselves, within the
Space of Forty Days after the First Publication
of this Order in the London Gazette, to the
Lord Chief Justice or one other of His Majesty's
Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to
one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

Hambourg, May 6. M. de Lith, the Saxon

The Bankruptcy of M. Croner, a Linnen
Merchant at Breslau, who has failed for near
100,000l. Sterling, will occasion some Losses
to several of the Merchants here, and will great-
ly hurt that Branch of Trade this Year.

Hague, May 6. The Prince of Orange will
begin his Progress about the 20th or 21st of this
Month, and will go by Delft, Rotterdam, and
Dort, to Zealand, and will return hither about
the Middle of June; and, after a short Stay,
continue to visit the other Provinces and Towns
of the Republick.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King,
That John Trotter, formerly a Servant to John Bac-
kett, Distiller, in the Borough, Southwark, but who
was discharged from the said Service about Eleven
Months since, was, on Thursday the 1st Instant, about
Seven

Ten o'Clock in the Evening, found concealed, behind some Casks, in the Cellar of the said John Bockett's House in the Borough aforesaid; and that some Person or Persons, supposed to be his Accomplices, did, between One and Two o'Clock in the Morning of the 24th attempt to pull out the Pin of the Ship Window-Scutters of the said John Bockett's, from whence, and sundry other Circumstances, it is apprehended, that the said John Bockett (who is now in Custody) had, together with his Accomplices, some evil Design against the House and Property of the said John Bockett: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Attempts and supposed evil Design, is hereby pleased to promise full and ample Pardon to any one of them, (except the said John Bockett, who was actually found concealed as aforesaid, who shall discover his or her Accomplices or Designers therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas I have received Information from his Excellency the Earl of Hertford, His Majesty's Lieutenant General and General Governor of the Kingdom of Ireland, That Part of the Cargo and Treasure of the Ship Earl of Sandwich, whereof John Cochran was late Commander. (who in his Voyage in her, from Terniff to London, was, together with Captain Glass, his Wife and Daughter, Passengers, and some other belonging to the said Ship, barbarously murdered by Part of the Crew thereof) having been found in the Coast of Ireland, is now properly secured in that Kingdom by his Excellency's Order; I give this Publick Notice thereof, to the End, that all Persons concerned in the Treasure and Cargo of the said Ship, so found and secured as aforesaid, may, without Loss of Time, authorize proper Persons to lay in their Claims, in the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland's Chief Secretary's Office in Dublin Castle, and agree upon a Method for settling and ascertaining their respective Properties and Proportions.
