Petersburg, April 22. Last Night died here, after a lingering Illness, in the 76th Year of his Age, Alexis Perrowitz Bestouchest Riumin, Count of the Russian and Roman Empires, Field Marshal, actual Privy Councillor and First Senator, Knight of the Orders of St. Andiew, of the White Eagle, of St. Alexander Newski, and of St. Anne.

He was appointed, in the Year 1713, Gentleman of the Bedchamber to the Elector of Hanover, afterwards King George the First, and was, by that Monarch, appointed his Minister to the Czar Peter the First, to notify his Ac-cession to the Throne, in 1714. In 1742 he was appointed Vice-Chancellor of the Russian Empire, and in 1744 Great Chancellor. He was banished to his Estate in 1758, and recalled in 1762 by the present Empress, who, in Confideration of his long Services, conferred on him a Pension of 20,000 Roubles ner Annum, which he enjoyed to his Death.
