**T**HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity; Sir Francis Molyneux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

*An Act for redeeming One Third Part of the Remainder of the Joint Stock of Annuities, established by an Act made in the Third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, in respect of several Navy, Victualling, and Transport Bills, and Ordnance Debentures.*

*An Act for applying the Money granted in this Session of Parliament, for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia of that Part of Great Britain called England, for one Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-six; and for explaining, amending, and rendering more effectual, several Acts of Parliament passed in the Second, Fourth, and Fifth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, relating to the raising and training the Militia within that Part of Great Britain called England.*

*An Act to prohibit the Importation of Foreign-wrought Silks and Velvets, for a limited Time; and preventing unlawful Combinations of Workmen employed in the Silk Manufacture.*

*An Act to prevent the fraudulent Marking of Frame-work knitted Pieces, and Stockings.*

*An Act to extend an Act made in the Fourth Year of the Reign of King George the First, intituled, "An Act for the further preventing Robbery, Burglary, and other Felonies, and for the more effectual Transportation of Felons, and unlawful Exporters of Wool, and for declaring the Law upon some Points relative to "Pirates," to that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, so far as the said Act relates to the more effectual Transportation of Felons; and for amending, and rendering more effectual, the Laws for restraining Muirburn, in forbidden Time, in that Part of the United Kingdom.*

*An Act for taking down, and removing, certain Light-houses now standing near the Spurn Point, at the Mouth of the Humber, and for erecting other fit and convenient Light-houses instead thereof.*

*An Act to regulate the Loading of Ships with Coals, in the Ports of Newcastle and Sunderland.*

*An Act to amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for repealing several Laws relating to the Manufacture of*

*Woollen Cloth in the County of York; and also so much of several other Laws as prescribes particular Standards of Width and Length of such Woollen Cloths, and for substituting other Regulations of the Cloth Trade within the West Riding of the said County; for preventing Frauds in certifying the Contents of the Cloth; and for preserving the Credit of the said Manufacture at the Foreign Market.*

*An Act for the better regulating Apprentices and Persons working under Contract.*

*An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual, the Powers of an Act made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, intituled, An Act for widening certain Streets, Lanes, and Passages, within the City of London, and Liberties thereof, and for opening certain new Streets and Ways within the same; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for the better paving, cleansing, and enlightening the City of London, and the Liberties thereof; and for preventing Obstructions and Annoyances within the same; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Road from High Bridges in the County of Stafford, to Uttoxeter, and from Spath to Hanging Bridge, and from Tewnalls Lane to Yoxall Bridge, in the said County.*

*An Act for amending, widening, altering, clearing, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from the Market Cross, in the Town of Wareham, and in Purbeck, in the County of Dorset.*

*An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of two Acts made in the Eighth and Twenty-seventh Years of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from Rashedale in the County Palatine of Lancaster, to the Towns of Halifax and Ealand in the County of York.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the present Turnpike Road, in the Parish of Hurley in the County of Southampton, through the Borough of Andover to the Town of Newbury in the County of Berks, and from Newbury to Chilton Pond and Newtown River.*

W H E R E A S John Hoskins, of the Parish of Seaton and Beer in the County of Devon, Labourer, Robert Bools, of the said Parish of Seaton and Beer in the said County, Labourer, Joseph Bartlett, of the said Parish of Seaton and Beer in the said County, Labourer, and Thomas Rew, of the Parish of Heavitree in the said County, Blacksmith, were, upon the Twenty-fifth Day of March last, charged, by Information of credible Persons upon Oath, by them subscribed, before James Carrington, Clerk, one

of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Devon, with having been guilty, on or about the Twenty-seventh Day of February last, of being, together with diverse other Persons, armed with Bludgeons, loaded Weapons, and other offensive Weapons, and, so armed, being assembled near a Place called Countess Wear in the Parish of Topham in the said County of Devon, in order to be aiding and assisting in the carrying away uncustomed Goods.—Which Information was afterwards certified by the said James Carrington, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided.—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command that the said John Hoskins, Robert Bools, Joseph Bartlett, and Thomas Rew, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the First Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

*Petersburg, April 22.* Last Night died here, after a lingering illness, in the 76th Year of his Age, Alexis Perrowitz Bestoucheff Riumin, Count of the Russian and Roman Empires, Field Marshal, actual Privy Councillor and First Senator, Knight of the Orders of St. Andrew, of the White Eagle, of St. Alexander Newski, and of St. Anne.

He was appointed, in the Year 1713, Gentleman of the Bedchamber to the Elector of Hanover, afterwards King George the First, and was, by that Monarch, appointed his Minister to the Czar Peter the First, to notify his Accession to the Throne, in 1714. In 1742 he was appointed Vice-Chancellor of the Russian Empire, and in 1744 Great Chancellor. He was banished to his Estate in 1758, and recalled in 1762 by the present Empress, who, in Consideration of his long Services, conferred on him a Pension of 20,000 Roubles per Annum, which he enjoyed to his Death.

*Naples, April 22.* His Sicilian Majesty has published an Edict, dated the 10th of April, 1766, forbidding any of his Subjects to leave his Dominions, and settle elsewhere, without his Leave in Writing.

*Florence, April 26.* Baron Reischach, Brother to the Countess Thurn the Grande Maitresse, is arrived here from Vienna, to notify to the Great Duke and Dutches the Marriage of the Archdutches Christine with the Prince of Saxony: He is to proceed to the Court of Naples with the same Commission.

*St. James's, May 17.*

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Precentor and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. David's, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of Dr. Samuel Squire, late Bishop thereof. And also his Majesty's Letter, recommending to the said Precentor and Chapter, Robert Lowth, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected Bishop of that See.
