**C**OUNT Gyldenstolphe had his Audiences of Leave Yesterday, and purposes setting out for Stockholm this Week.

Stockholm, April 29. Count Scheel, who brings the Order of the Elephant from the King of Denmark to the Prince Royal of Sweden, has had his first Audience To-day.

Dresden, May 4. Count and Chevalier de Coigny, Brothers to the Duke of that Name, the former Colonel of the Legion Royale, and the latter Guidon of the Gendarmerie in the French Service, have been these Two Days at this Court. They set out this Evening for Berlin, to be present at the Reviews, which are to begin very soon.

Berlin, May 10. On the 6th Instant, in the Morning, his Majesty, attended by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and a numerous Retinue, arrived here from Potsdam. His Majesty, before he entered the City, reviewed divers Regiments of this Garrison, which he found drawn up before the Gate of Halle. His Majesty then went to the Palace, where he received the usual Compliments from the Nobility and Foreign Ministers at this Court. The Day following his Majesty reviewed in the Thier Garten, four Regiments of Infantry, being the rest of the Garrison; after which he went to Charlottenbourg, and dined with several of his General Officers, and in the Afternoon returned, with Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, to Potsdam.

Some Days ago the Marquis de Conflans, Commander of a Regiment of Hussars in the French Service, arrived here, in order to be present at the ensuing grand Review.
