Vienna, May 14.

Yesterday, being her Imperial Majesty's and the Archdutchess Marie Christine's Birth-day, there was a grand Appearance at Court, a publick Dinner for the Imperial Family, with another Table for One Hundred and Thirty Persons, and a Drawing-Room in the Evening. The Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers, and Principal Nobility went as usual to pay their Compliments on this Occasion to the Emperor, and the Rest of the Imperial Family, at Schonbrun.

Berlin, May 24. On the 21st, 22d, and 23d Instant, the King of Prussia reviewed, in the Plain of Templehoff, about an English Mile distant from hence, a Body of Twenty-five Thousand Men. Each Day they performed different Military Evolutions and Manceuvres; and his Prussian Majesty, after the Review was over, was pleased to express to the General Officers his entire Satisfaction, as well with the noble Appearance the Troops made, as with the Dexterity with which they went through these Exercises.

Yesterday in the Afternoon the King of Prussia went from this Place to Charlottenbourg; and To-morrow Morning he sets out from thence for Cultrin and Stargard in Pomerania, in order to review the Troops assembled at those Places.

The several Regiments that arrived in this Capital last Tuesday, to assist at the Review, marched from hence very early this Morning for their respective Garrisons.

Weight, which they carried and conveyed away.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring these Offenders to Justice, do hereby give Notice, That if any Person or Persons will discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the said Offenders, such Person or Persons will be intitled to the Reward of Fifty Pounds for each Person so apprehended; to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction.
