he received of the infention of the French to take polfeffion of his Countrey for the King of Sueden, who is his Heir, fentan Express to the Elector of Mayence to demand affiltance, but did not obtain any.

Francfort, fan. 26. The feizing of Deux Ponts by the French, has fomewhat alarmed the Imperialifts, who have drawn together a Body of 4000 Horfe, part of which have already passed the Rhine at Lauterbargh, as the reft will do, if there shall be found occasion. It is faid that the Governor of Brifac hath lately fenc to the Magistrates of Strasburgh, to let them know, that for fecurity that the Imperialists shall not make use of their Bridge this Campagne, his Most Christian Majely expects they shall caufe four or five Arches of the faid Bridge to be broken down, to which they have not yet returned any answer. The last week the Duke of Lorrain gave out Commissions for the raising three Regiments The other new Levies and Recruits are of Dragoons. very much haftened, and it's faid the Emperor will have a very confiderable Army on the Rhine, besides the Troops he shall think fit to employ elsewhere, either by way of diversion, or as fuccors to any of his Allies.

Cologne, Jan. 27. The Duke of Newburgh finding his Countries continually vexed by paying the Contributions demanded by both Parties, has, it's fuid, refolved, that for the future they fhall pay none at all; and to make good that refolution, is about forming a good Body of Men, having given out Commiffions for the raifing 7000 Foot, and 2000 Horfe. The other day a French Party of 400 Horfe, was almost at our very Gates, fo that we even live here in continual Frights and 'Alarms. The Dutch Regiments under the Command of Colonel Weede, are arrived at Treves, and the Government of that place is, it's faid, put into the hands of Major General Fariau. Our Magistrates have excufed themselves from furnishing the quantities of Corn defiyed by the Imperialists.

Hamburgh, Jan. 27. We have not as yet a certain account of the Suedes having quitted the Siege of Wel-gaft, though it is the general belief, they have, and that they have loft 7 or 800 Men before the place. From Berlin they write, That feveral Danifb and Brandenburgh Regiments were ordered to join in the Countrey of Mecklenburgh, in order to their making an incursion into Pomeren, under the command of the Velt Marefchal Dorfling. Our last Letters from Bremen leave us fill in doubt concerning the Surrender of CarelSladt; they faid, that it was reported there, that the place had been delivered up the 22 inftant, according to the Capizulation, but that they had not any certainty of it. We have Letters from Sueden, which inform us, that that King is on the fide of Gottenburgh; that he hath drawn a great many Forces together, refolving to make fome attempt upon the Danes, which may divert them from the thoughts of turning their Arms against the Suedif Territories in Germany. Here has been a re-port fpread abroad, as if the Suedes had offered to put Stade into the hands of the Duke, of Zell, till the conclusion of the Peace ; but upon enquiry, we find it to be

without any ground. Berlin, Jan. 21. The Elector of Brandenburgh hath been of late fomewhat indipoled, but is now pretty well again. The Governor of Wolgaft has by an Express advertiled his Electoral Highness, that the Sucdes had made two Attacks, but that they had still been repulfed with confiderable loss, and that they were thereupon going to raife the Siege.

ing to raife the Siege. Bruffels, Jon. 31. We have now the certainty that the French have demolifhed the Calles of Efebffines

and la Folie, which we told you in our last they had pollessed themselves of, to open a Communication between Aeib and Charletoy. Since , we hear flot any thing further of the Marcfchal d' numieres, though it's believed he wil not return he me without some farther action. But from Liege we lave a !vice, That 4000 French having marches out of Li ge and Maestricht, under the command of the Marelel. Il d'Estrades, to attack the Cattle of H.cr, fitnale between Tongres, St. Tros, and Warren, where the Dutch had a Garifon, the Baron de Couri res, who comman's the Spanifb Cavalry, quartered on that Fionitici, by order of his Excellency the Dake de Villa Hormofa, drew his Troops together, and marched with them in Sunday laft about A 2 at night, in order ty Lis conjunction with the Dutch Troops that were to match ou of Haffelt, under the conduct of Major General Winneamum, who commands the Dutch Troops there, in the absence of the Count de Naffan, General of the Cavalry; on Monday, about fix in the morting, the Baren Courieres arrived at the place appointed for the Rendezvous, about a League from Haffelt, where he joined the Dut.h Troops; that done, they fent out a Party towards Maestricht, following with the refl of their Forces; that evening they took their flation within fight of Mzeffricht, and continued all the night following in Arms, and on Tuefday morning marched towards Heer, to relieve the place, being about 6 or 7000 ftrong ; but on their march they underflood that the Enemy had quitted their Enterprize, after having continued it two days, and loft 3 or 400 men in i., and were retired to wards MacHricht by the way of Huy. I he new Counfellors which his Excellency has a ded to thuse belonging to the States of Flanders, are feiled in their places, for which they pay 160000 Fio. insto the King, From Lipstadt, of the 26 inftant, they write, That the Lifhop of Munfler had caufed the Boors of the Countrey of Effen to affemble, and to force from thence the Brandenburgh Troops that were qua tered there. M jor General Firiau in the Dutch farvice, and formerly Governor of Maeftricht, when taken by the French, is made Governor of Treves.

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
