Lisbon, June 7.

**O**N Thursday the 29th past, his most Faithful Majesty attended at the Publick Procession of the Corpus Christi at the Patriarchal See; and on Sunday another Procession of the same was made at the King's Palace of N. S. d'Ajuda: Upon this Occasion his most Faithful Majesty created the Marshal Count Baron, a Marquis, by the Title of Marquis of Alvito, with a Grant of several Lands to be annexed to his Estate. The Chief Admiral Senhor Dom John has likewise obtained a Grant of a considerable Commanderie.

Wednesday last, being His Britannick Majesty's Birth-Day, the Portuguese and Foreign Ministers, and several of the Nobility of this Country, dined with the Honourable Mr. Hay, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to this Court: And Yesterday, being his most Faithful Majesty's Birth-Day, the Foreign Ministers paid their Compliments to their Majesties and the Royal Family; after which there was a publick Kissing of Hands, in the usual Manner; and in the Evening an Opera in the King's Private Theatre.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable William-Henry Earl of Rochford Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Most Christian King.
