Berlin, Fan. 22. We are here very ftill, were it not that preparations are making for an expedition into Pomeren ; and fome fay, that the defign is upon Straelfont, though others cannot believe that his Electoral Highness will think fit to attempt a place of that ftrength in this feafon. We have not as yet any certain account that the Suedes have quitted the Siege of Wolgaft, though this is fure, that the Governor thereof has given his Electoral Highness an account of his having repulsed the Suedes in two Affaults they made with great lofs, and that he was in condition to maintain the place without ftanding in need of any fuccors.

Bremen, Jan. 25. On the 22 inflant, Carelsburg, according to the Capitulation, was delivered up to the Confederates; 300 Suedes marched out, belides 150 fick : and 200 Danes, 200 Lunenburgs, and 200 Munfterlens entred in their room: The command of the place is to be alternatively in their hands, that is, the Dane to command the first three dayes, then the Lunenburgh three dayes, and fo on, till it be agreed to whole repartition the place is to belong. The Confederates, it's faid, found in the place above 60 pieces of Cannon, 5000 l. of Powder, and a great quantity of Bullets, but they were not a little furprized, that there remained not an handful of Meal or Corn, or any Bread ; so that the place was held out to the very last minute, that is, as long as they had wherewithall to fubfilt. We hear that the Sovernor of Stade has fome days fince fent out another Party to fall upon fome other Munster Troops that are abroad; the last Rencounter near Friburg was of confiderable importance; for it's faid above 600 Munfiers were killed, and taken Prifoners.

Bruffels, Jan. 31. The Duke de Villa Hermofa begins to mend very confiderably, fo that in a day or two it's hoped he may be abroad again. We have no farther account of the Mareschal d' Humieres, though it's believed he will posses himself of some other Castles which incommode the French, before he returns home. We impatiently expect the Ordinary from spain and Italy, as well to hear whether there be as yet any news of the Galions, as what has passed between the Dutch and French Fleets on the Coaft of Sicily.

Hague, Jan. 31. We have very little at prefent to write from hence, unlefs it be to confirm what we have already told you of the Surrender of Carelfiat on the 22 inftant, according to the Capitulation, there remaining then not Bread for the Garifon for one day longer, but good flore of Ammunition, and above 40 pieces of Cannon; 300 Suedes marched out of the place, and 200 Danes, 200 Lunenburghs, and 200 Munsteriens entred in their room, who are to command alternatively, that is to fay, the Dane the first three dayes, then the Lunenburghs three dayes, Gc. On the other fide we are greatly pleafed with the advice we receive from Liege, of the Mareschal d' Estrades having been forced to quit his enterprize upon Heer, a Caffle scituate not far from Tongres, and to retire in great confusion. The Prince of Orange does all he can to get into the Field as foon as the French, and therefore the Officers have politive orders to finish their Recruits against the end of February. The affair of the Congress is now wholly at a stand, through the difficulties made in the matter of Pasports. Yesterday the Heer Clingenberg, Ambaffador of the King of Denmark, parted hence on his return for Copenhagen. On Monday last arrived five or fix Domesticks of the French Ambaffadors at Nimeguen, to prepare things against the arrival of their Excellencies, who only stay for their Passports from hence.

Marseilles, Fan. 16. Here is a report (but from

whence it comes we cannot learn) that there hath been an Engagement between the French and Dutch Fleets in the Fare of Mellins, but with what fuccels not faid ; which fome are the more apt to give credit to, for that we have advice from other hands, that a Veffel palling through the Fare, met with Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter Cruifing there with about 30 Sail ; and that having failed about 30 Leagues farther, likewife met the French Fleet as it was entring into the Fare, confifting in 40 Sail; that the Master of this Vessel was commanded on board the French Admiral, whom he acquainted where the Durch Fleer was 3 and that the French had continued their course, as before, directly for Meffina, declaring that they would fight their way thither, if oppofed."

Paris, F.br. 1. Yesterday was a general review at St. Germains of the Troops of the Houshold, in the presence of his Mattry and the whole Court; and it's faid they have orders to had themselves ready to march. We have advice by the way of Marfeilles of the arrival of our Fleet, which parted lately from Theulon, at Meffina, of which we expect the confirmation. The discourse at Court is, that the Duke of Orleans will command the Army this Campagne in Flanders, and under him the Maref-chal de Monimorency; that the Prince of Conde will not go in-to the Field at all 5 and that his fon, the Duke d' Englisen, will command in Germany, and under him the Marefchal de Schom-berg. The Marefchal d'Albret is lately dead in his Govern-ment of Guyenne, as likewife the Bifhop of Reanes. Our Ambaf-fadors are ftill at Charleville, expeding the Dutch and Spanifh Palsports, as well as thofe of their Allies, which it's faid they make a difficulture give our King artifactor they Take a difficulty to give out, for that our King refufes to give the title of Duke, to the prefent Duke of Lorrain, in the Pals-ports that are to be diffatched for his Ministers. We have ad-vice from Sufferland, that the General Dyet of the Cantons was begun ; and that Monfieur de St. Romain continued there, to take care of the affairs of this Crown, till the arrival of his
