Florence, June 28.

THE Great Duke has performed the Ceremony of receiving Homage of his Subjects. The Procession began, at Eight in the Morning, from the Palace near the Town, at the Gate of which his Royal Highness got on Horseback, the Furniture and Bridle of which was very richly adorned with Jewels; and, being attended by his whole Court on Foot, went through the principal Street to the Great Square, where the Ceremony was performed. He was seated on a Throne, erected under an open Lodge, where the Senate and principal Magistrates were disposed according to their Ranks. The Great Dutchess, who with her whole Court followed in Seven Coaches and Six, saw the Ceremony from a Balcony in the Old Palace; and, when it was over, she joined the Great Duke in a Procession on Foot to the Church of St. John, which is at a considerable Distance; from whence, after a short Prayer, the Great Duke on Horseback, and the Great Dutchess with her Attendants in Coaches, returned to the Palace in Town in the same Manner in which they set out. At Noon they dined in Public; and Marshal Botta entertained at his House the Officers of the Court, the Foreign Ministers, and many others. In the Afternoon the Court, attended by the Noble Guard on Horseback, and followed by many of the Nobility in their Coaches, paraded through the principal Street, where there was afterwards a Horse-Race in the Italian Manner without Riders; and, in the Evening, the Great Duke and Dutchess went, first, to the Great Theatre for one Act of the Opera, and afterwards to a Comedy in the Little Theatre; both which were illuminated on this Occasion. The whole Court was in the greatest Splendour: The Noble Guard had a new and very rich Uniform, which, with their Accoutrements, is said to have cost 60,000 Crowns: The Pages were dressed in red Velvet laced with Gold; and

the whole Livery was likewise new; so that in every Part the Appearance was very magnificent.

Vienna, June 28. Count Mercy set out for Spa Yesterday Morning; and the French Ambassador on Thursday Evening for Paris.

The King of Spain having created Count Branicki, Great General of Poland, a Knight of his Order of the Golden Fleece about six Months ago, M. de Las Casas, Secretary to the Spanish Embassy to this Court, sets out To-day for that Country, to carry him the Ensigns of the Order, and to receive him into it.

Copenhagen, July 5. The Marriage between Prince Charles of Hesse Cassel, and her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, Youngest Sister to his Danish Majesty, was Yesterday declared at the Palace of Herholm, when the Court was assembled on that Occasion. The Mourning was suspended for that Day, and every Lady appeared in Gala. At the same Time the King was pleased to make several Promotions, the Principal of which were, the Government of Rendsburg to Count Knuth.

Baron Windt, Knight of the Order of Dannebrog, and Grand Master to the Queen Dowager, died here on the 29th of last Month. He was formerly Minister from this to several Foreign Courts, and among others to that of Great-Britain.
