AT the Court at St. James's, the 16th Day of July, 1766,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Oxford and Mortimer, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Radnor, his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Whitehall, July 19.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Sir Henry Cheere, Knt. and the Heirs Male of his Body lawfully begotten, the Dignity of a Baronet of the Kingdom of Great Britain.

Whitehall, July 19.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Philip Hone wood, Esq; Lieutenant-General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of and Captain of the Town of Kingston upon Hull, and of the Forts, Blockhouses, and Fortifications belonging to the same, in the Room and Place of General Pulteney.

Whitehall, July 19, 1766.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, That the Two following anonymous threatening Letters, the former of which was found on Saturday Morning the 12th Instant, in the Area of the House of Mrs. Perry, at Kensington, and the latter on Monday Evening the 14th Instant, in the Garden of Mrs. Whitaker, at Kensington, containing the following Words, and directed as follows:

" To Mrs. Whitaker, Perry, Wakefield, or Main.

" We do desire that you will take more Notice of this Letter than you did of the last or by the eternal god we will make you quit the houses if we have no opportunity to do it by fire before they are empty we will be the death of some of you some night or other the first opportunity if we see no preparation of movement and by god we will poison the water that serves the houses if we die in the attempt done it shall be for before this day 5 Months them houses shal have no body in

" them I would sooner die at Tyburn then them
" rascalls dogs shall have any good of them, we
" would not hurt a hair of one of your heads but if
" you will not leave it, expect the Death of one or
" two very soon."

" To Mrs Wakefield.

" Mrs Wakefield We do desire you will not let
" the Yong Gentelman make no more such a dan-
" gerous attempt as he did last Night to look out at
" the Window when we was in the adjoining Gar-
" dens for if he had continued there 2 Minuets
" longer we should have fired at you and so we
" will the first that attempts to open a Window any
" more I am afraid we must take the lives of some
" of you before you will leave itt, for By God
" we will poison the Waters for as we wrote before
" we will sooner die than dropt itt, we shall never
" write to you more you have had Notice enough.

For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in writing the said Letters, His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually wrote the said Letters) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, a Reward of Thirty Guineas is hereby promised to any Person or Persons making such Discovery (except as before excepted) to be paid upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
