Constantinople, July 1.

**O**N Thursday the 26th past, John Murray, Esq; His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador to the Porte, went in great State, accompanied by most of the Gentlemen of the Factory and the Drugomen, and had an Audience of the Grand Vizir, who received him with all possible Marks of Esteem and Friendship. And this Day he went in the same State to, and had an Audience of, the Grand Signior, who was seated on a magnificent Throne, attended by the Grand Vizir and his High Treasurer: The Grand Signior received him with Politeness, and expressed great Respect for His Britannick Majesty; and was pleased to say, that he would always protect the Consuls, Merchants, Drugomen, and all the Subjects of the King of Great-Britain, in their Privileges in this Empire.

The Damage which this City and the Public Works have sustained from the Earthquake, is computed at near a Million and a Half Sterling.

Vienna, July 23. The Emperor returned last Sunday Morning from his Tour, in perfect Health, and will continue here until the latter End of next Month, when the Military Manoeuvres of the two Corps that are to incamp, in a few Days, in Bohemia and Moravia, will begin.

On Saturday the 26th of July, Mr. Ruffel, one of His Majesty's Messengers, arrived at the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Conway's Office, with the Treaty of Commerce concluded between His Majesty and the Empress of Russia, which was signed at Petersbourg on the 20th of June last, Old Stile.

St. James's, August 2, 1766.
