Lisbon, July 31.

THIS Court having received Advice of the Death of the Queen-Mother of Spain on the 11th Instant, their most Faithful Majesties and the Royal Family retired the 16th for Eight Days, and put on Mourning for Six Months. On Thursday last the Spanish Ambassador had his Audience to present his Letters of Notification: And the other Foreign Ministers waited upon their Majesties and the Royal Family, to pay their Compliments of Condolence.

Friday being the Birth day of her Royal Highness the Infanta Dona Maria Francisca Benedicta, the same was observed at Court: And Saturday being St. Ann's, her most Faithful Majesty's Name-day, the Royal Family appeared in full Gala, and received the Compliments usual upon this Occasion.

His Britannick Majesty's Ship the *Æolus*, commanded by the Honourable Capt. Gower, arrived on Wednesday from Gibraltar, and will proceed, in a few Days, for that Garrison and Minorca.

Lisbon, August 13. On Sunday the 10th Instant arrived the Duke of York Packet with the Mails of the 15th and 22d of July; and this Day came in the Expedition Packet with the Mail of the 29th past.

His Serene Highness the Infante Dom Emanuel, Uncle to his most Faithful Majesty, who has been some Years in a declining State, was seized, very early on Sunday the 3d Instant, with a Fit of Apoplexy, and expired before Ten of the Clock that Morning, compleating that very Day the 60th Year of his Age. His Highness's Corpse was conveyed, in great State, the next Night, from the Palace of his Residence to the Church of St. Vincent, and there deposited in the same Vault with his Royal Ancestors.

Their most Faithful Majesties and the Royal Family retired upon this Occasion for Eight Days, and put on Mourning for Two Months: And Yesterday the Foreign Ministers had the Honour to pay their Compliments of Condolence.

Turin, August 16. To-morrow his Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick is expected in Town, from making his Tour in the Alps.

Nice, August 16. Tuesday last the 12th Instant, about Eight o'Clock in the Evening, arrived here his Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, from a Tour he had made in Visiting most of the fortified Places which the King of Sardinia has in the Mountains. His Highness alighted at the Governor's House, where he lodged during his short Stay here. Next Morning his Highness visited the River Varr, and in the Afternoon went to see the New Port at Lympia. The Morning following he went to Montalban, and from thence returned to Turin, by the Way of Menton and Dulce Aqua.

Hamburg, August 22. M. de Neilus is arrived here from Petersburgh, with the Character of Chargé des Affaires in the Interim of the Appointment of a Minister.

M. le Comte Schulemberg, Envoy Extraordinary from the Court of Denmark to That of Saxony, and M. Dumont, the French Resident at Dantzick, are both come hither from Pyrmont, returning to their Posts.

St. James's, August 30.

The King has been pleased to nominate, constitute, and appoint the Right Honourable James Stuart Mackenzie to be Keeper of His Majesty's Privy Seal of Scotland, in the Room of the Right Honourable John Earl of Breadalbane.

St. James's, August 27.

This Day M. Landriani, Minister from the Duke of Modena, had his Audience of Leave; And the Count de Poggi, his Successor, his first private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials.

To which they were introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Shelburne, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.
