THereas His Majesty hath signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now flands Prorogued to the Thirtieth Day of this Instant August, be further Prorogued to the Twenty-first Day of April next, 1767: We do therefore Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the faid Parliament is hereby further Prorogued to the Twentyfirst Day of April next; whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

Saltoff, in the Province of Belgorod, June 3, O. S. Yesterday happened here a most violent Storm of Thunder and Lightening, Wind and Rain, which has done incredible Damage, and entirely destroyed all Hopes of a tolerable Harvest for this Year. There fell, at the same Time, a prodigious Quantity of Hail-Stones, of a square Form, and larger in Size than a common Walnut; and, what is very remarkable, though the Weather was extremely hot, they lay on the Ground above a Quarter of an Hour before they melted.

Turin, August 20. His Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick arrived in Town last Sunday, about Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, in perfect Health, from his Journey in the Alps; and feems extremely well pleafed and fatisfied with the King of Sardinia's great Attention to have him provided with every Thing necessary to make his Excursion agreeable. On Monday his Serene Highness paid his Court to all the Royal Family, and had a most gracious Reception. Yesterday he dined at his Excellency Count de Viry's; and this Day with the King and the Royal Family. His Serene Highnels proposes leaving this Place next Saturday, and to take Alexandria, Cafal, Tortona, and Pavia, in his Way to Milan, where he proposes staving two or three Days, and then to pursue his Travels to Venice by the Way of Parma, Plazencia, Bologna, and Padua, and hopes to be at Venice the 18th or 19th of next Month.
