HIS Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick took Leave of his Sardinian Majesty, the Duke of Savoy, and the Rest of the Royal Family, last Friday Evening, with whom his Serene Highness was several Hours; and last Saturday Morning early he set out for Milan.
