ON Wednesday the 1st Instant, in the Evening, the Ceremony of the Espousals, or Contract of Marriage, between his Majesty Christian the VIIth, King of Denmark, (represented by his Royal Highness the Duke of York, his Procurator) and her Royal Highness the Princess Caroline Mathilda, His Majesty's youngest Sister, was solemnly performed in the Great Council Chamber here, by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury. The next Morning early her Majesty the Queen of Denmark, with her Attendants and Retinue, set out from Carlton House for Harwich, where her Majesty arrived on Thursday last, about Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, and intended to embark on Board the Mary Yacht for Holland, as soon as the Wind should be favourable.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been informed by Addresses from the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of London, the Cities of Bristol and Norwich, and other considerable Corporations, and numerous Bodies of Men, that the Price of Wheat has gradually increased ever since the Ports were opened by the Expiration of the Act of the last Session of Parliament prohibiting the Exportation of Corn, and that at Bear Key it is above the Bounty-Price, and in most other Places in the Kingdom greatly exceeding the same, and it is upon the strongest Ground to be presumed to be still rising; that the Stock in Hand is very inconsiderable, and that the Crop of the present Year has failed in such a Proportion, that if the Exportation be not immediately stopped, there is great Cause to foresee that very shortly there will not remain in the Kingdom a Quantity sufficient for the necessary Supply of His Majesty's Subjects.---And whereas this Apprehension is much increased from the undoubted Informations His Majesty has received, that from the Failure of, and Deficiencies in the Crops in several Foreign Parts, Commissions have been received from thence to purchase Wheat, to supply such Foreign Markets, at an unlimited Price; and which Commissions are, at this Time, larger and more ex-

tensive than have been known at any Time; so that unless His Majesty should, upon this Emergency, exert His Royal Authority to prevent the further Exportation of Wheat and Wheat Flour, His Majesty's Subjects would be in Danger of Want, whilst Foreigners are supplied from this Country.---And whereas the Parliament standing prorogued to the Eleventh Day of November next, His Majesty has not an Opportunity of taking the Advice of His Parliament speedily enough upon the present Emergency to stop the Progress of a Mischief daily increasing, and which, if not immediately provided against, might be productive of Calamities past all Possibility of Remedy---It is therefore, upon the Grounds of the above urgent Necessity now impending, and for the Safety, Benefit, and Sustainance of His Majesty's Subjects, that His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That an Embargo be forthwith laid upon all Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden, in the Ports of Great Britain, with Wheat or Wheat Flour, to be Exported to Foreign Parts; and that the said Embargo do continue and remain, from the Date hereof, until the Fourteenth Day of November next---And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath received Information, that the Price of Wheat has gradually increased ever since the Ports were opened by the Expiration of the Act of the last Session of Parliament prohibiting the Exportation of Corn, and that in the Port of London, the Price of Wheat has been for two successive Market Days, above Forty-eight Shillings the Quarter Winchester Measure; and it is upon the strongest Grounds to be presumed to be still rising---His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy-Council, (pursuant to the Powers vested in His Majesty for that Purpose, by an Act passed

passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second) hereby Prohibit the Making, Extracting, or Distilling, of any Kind of Low Wines, or Spirits, from any Wheat, Wheat Meal, Wheat Flour, or Wheat Bran, or any Mixture therewith, from the Date hereof until the Fourteenth Day of November next: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience to His Majesty's Commands hereby signified.

The following Address of the Governor and Company of the English Colony of Connecticut in New England in America, has been presented to the King by the Earl of Sheburne, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Governor and Company of the English Colony of Connecticut in New England in America.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE the Governor and Company of your Majesty's English Colony of Connecticut in New England in America, inspired with the warmest Sentiments of Loyalty and Obedience to your gracious Majesty, beg Leave with Humility to approach your Royal Presence, with our unanimous Acknowledgments of the innumerable Benefits we enjoy under your most auspicious Reign; and particularly to return our grateful Tribute of humble and hearty Thanks to your Majesty, for giving your Royal Assent to an Act for repealing a late Act of the Parliament of Great-Britain, for granting and applying certain Stamp Duties in the Colonies and Plantations in America: An Act which had filled your faithful Subjects in these Colonies with the deepest Concern.

Your Majesty's Wisdom and Clemency, so signally displayed on this interesting Occasion, hath happily restored Tranquility, filled our Hearts with Joy and Gladness, and diffused universal Felicity throughout all your Majesty's American Dominions; has inexpressibly endeared your sacred Person to your loyal and dutiful Subjects in this Colony, confirmed our Confidence in the Justice and Goodness of the August Legislature of Great Britain, and filled us with the most cordial and respectful Gratitude and Affection to our Mother Country.

Our Subjection to your Majesty's Government, and Connexion with Great Britain, we have always esteemed the Safety and Happiness of this Country; and we rejoice in the rising Prospect, that under your Majesty's wife, mild, and auspicious Reign, a permanent and harmonious Intercourse, mutually beneficial and advantageous, may be established between Great Britain and her Colonies, whereby the Interest of both Countries (on which the Glory, Safety, and Happiness of the whole Empire so much depends) will be greatly promoted.

A steady unshaken Loyalty, Fidelity, and warm Devotion to your Majesty, and your Royal Progenitors of the illustrious House of Hanover, have ever been the Boast of this Colony; and, under their auspicious Protection, we have enjoyed those Rights and Liberties, which, from small Beginnings, have, under God, been the Means of rendering this Colony a valuable Part of your Majesty's Dominions. These, and other signal Favours and Blessings enjoyed by us under your Majesty's wife and righteous Government, and especially the Condescension of our most gracious King on the late important Occasion, demand from us the most sincere Thankfulness and Praise to God, the Supreme Author of all Good, and Disposer of all Events, as well as the liveliest Sentiments of Gratitude and Loyalty to your Majesty.

With Minds impressed with the deepest Sense of your Majesty's eminent Wisdom and Goodness; of the Abilities and Patriot Spirit of your Ministers; and the Magnanimity, Prudence, and Equity of those who compose the British Legislature; and animated by the happy Prospect, that the Trade of America in particular, as well as the British Commerce in general, may be established upon the most solid Foundation and extensive Plan of Utility; we shall steadily pursue such Measures as shall most effectually tend to support the Dignity of your Majesty's Government in this Colony, and contribute to the general Emolument and Glory of the British Empire.

Sensible of the great Happiness we enjoy under your Majesty's most wise and equitable Government, and encouraged by the many gracious Assurances and convincing Proofs given by your Majesty, of your kind and benevolent Attention to all your faithful Subjects, even the most remote; permit us, most gracious Sovereign, to recommend your Colony of Connecticut to your Paternal Care and kind Protection.

May your Majesty, with increasing Felicity and Glory, continue to a far distant Period, to fill and adorn the Throne of your illustrious Ancestors; and your Royal Progeny, in our Succession, reign over a free, grateful, and happy People, in Europe and America, with Dignity and Renown to the latest Ages.

We are, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful, loyal, and obedient Subjects, The Governor and Company of the Colony of Connecticut.

Copenhagen, September 23. Count Horn, the Swedish Ambassador, arrived here on the 16th Instant, accompanied by Nine Cavaliers d'Ambassade. He notified his Arrival to the Foreign Ministers on the 18th, and Yesterday had his first Audience of the King and the Royal Family, who removed to Copenhagen for this Purpose; where they are to remain till the Departure of the Princess Royal.

Dresden, September 23. M. d'Ende is appointed to succeed Count Einsiedel as Minister of State for the Interior Department.
