*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Council and Commons of your Majesty's Province of Georgia, in General Assembly met, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person with Hearts full of the most dutiful Affection and Gratitude.

Influenced by Principle, and animated by your Majesty's exemplary Justice and Paternal Care in redressing the Grievances of your faithful Subjects in these remote Parts of your wide extended Empire, with the deepest Sense of your Majesty's Royal Clemency and Goodness, we humbly offer to your most Sacred Majesty our sincere Thanks for the Repeal of the late Act of the British Parliament, commonly called the American Stamp-Act: Nor can we sufficiently revere the Magnanimity and Justice displayed by the British Parliament on this Occasion.

Permit us, Dread Sir, while we endeavour to express our Gratitude to the best of Kings, for affording us so speedy and necessary Relief, to assure your Majesty, that we shall, upon all Occasions, strive to evince our Loyalty and firm Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, being truly sensible of the Advantages derived to us from the Protection of our

Mother Country; and that it is, and ever will be, our Honour, Happiness, and true Interest, to remain connected with and dependent on, the Imperial Crown and Parliament of Great Britain, upon the solid Basis of the British Constitution.

That your Majesty's Illustrious House may continue to reign over a free, loyal, and grateful People, to the latest Posterity, is, most Gracious Sovereign, our constant Prayer, unfeigned Wish, and our most sanguine Hopes.

Admiralty-Office, October 10.

*Extract of a Letter from the Honourable Rear Admiral Keppel, to Mr. Stephens, Secretary of the Admiralty, dated on Board the Katherine Yacht in the Maeje, the 8th of October, 1766.*

**I** Arrived on the Coast of Holland Yesterday Morning, and got safe over the Boarder, with her Danish Majesty, about Ten o'Clock, and am now in so fair a Way, that I expect to land her Majesty at Rotterdam To-morrow.

*Berlin, September 30.* Last Sunday Evening the Prince Royal of Prussia, with the Princess his Consort, young Prince Henry of Prussia, his Serene Highness the Margrave of Anspach, and the two Princes of Brunswick in this Service, arrived in Berlin from Potzdam, and his Prussian Majesty is expected here as next Friday. Some Days ago M. de Rexin, the King of Prussia's Minister, during the late War, at the Ottoman Porte, arrived in this Capital from Constantinople.

*St. James's, October 11.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto Francis Earl of Hertford the Office of Master of His Majesty's Horses, in the room of his Grace John Duke of Rutland.

*Whitehall, October 11.*

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Wills Earl of Hillsborough of the Kingdom of Ireland, Same Jenkins, Edward Eliot, George Rice, John Roberts, Jeremiah Dyson, William Fitzherbert, and Thomas Robinson, Esquires, to be His Majesty's Commissioners for Trade and Plantations.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Robert Coney, John Cowslade, Francis Hales, and George Chad, Esquires, together with John Grey, Esq; in the room of Marmaduke Sowle, Esq; deceased, to be Commissioners for Appeals, and regulating His Majesty's Duties of Excise.
