The following Address of the Mayor, Burgesses and Commonalty of the City of Bristol, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Conway, has, by him, been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Mayor, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the City of Bristol, in Common-Council assembled, humbly beseech your Majesty to accept our sincere Congratulation on the safe Delivery of the Queen, the Birth of a Princess Royal, and also on the Marriage of your Royal Sister with that Great and Respectable Potentate the King of Denmark: Your faithful Subjects considering these pleasing Events, and every Increase of your illustrious Family, publick Blessings, as they add to the Happiness of the best of Kings, and, at the same Time, render more secure the inestimable Benefits enjoyed under your Majesty's most auspicious Protection.

And here, Dread Sir, permit us to make our grateful Acknowledgments for your Majesty's most tender and gracious Attention to the Welfare of your People, in restraining the further Exportation of Wheat, and prohibiting the same from being distilled. So seasonable an Exertion of your Royal Authority demands the utmost Return of Gratitude and Duty from all your Subjects, whose Fears were awakened on Account of a deficient Harvest. We trust, that through the Spirit and Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, the Minds of honest and good Men will be quieted, and the Necessities of your People effectually relieved: And we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that as we always esteem your Paternal Regard for these Kingdoms the true Basis of our Prosperity, so we shall make it the Study of our Lives to conduct ourselves, in our several Stations, as becomes Subjects deeply sensible of the Wisdom and Justice of your Majesty's Government.

St. Petersburg, August 30. This Day, being the Feast of St. Alexander Newski, was celebrated here with the usual Ceremonies. Her Imperial Majesty, and his Imperial Highness the

Great Duke, followed by the Knights of this Order, walked in Procession from the Cazan Church to the Monastery of St. Alexander Newski; at the Great Gate of which they were received by the Archbishop of St. Petersburg, and conducted to the Chapel, where they had Divine Service. As soon as that Ceremony was ended, the principal Clergy had the Honour of kissing the Empress's Hand. At Twelve o'Clock the Guns of the Fortress and Admiralty were fired, and her Imperial Majesty, attended as before, proceeded to the Summer Palace, where she received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and the Chief Nobility. She afterwards dined in Publick with his Imperial Highness the Great Duke, and the Knights of the Order: During the Repast a Concert of Vocal and Instrumental Musick was performed; and, at every Health that was drank, the Guns were fired in the usual Number. At Night there was a grand Ball at Court, and the whole City was illuminated.

Cadiz, September 26. Two Days ago the Spanish Ships of War, San Fernando, of 80 Guns, and the Brillante of 60 Guns, with the Astræa and Punto-Fixo Frigates, arrived in this Bay from the Havana, and are said to have brought Home between two and three Millions of Dollars for the Commerce.

Copenhagen, October 11. The whole Royal Family accompanied the Princess Sophia Magdalena to Elsenour on Tuesday the 7th Instant; and on the 8th her Royal Highness passed the Sound to Helsingborg, where she was received by the Prince her Consort, and a Deputation from the Senate to compliment her upon her Arrival in the Territories of Sweden.

Dresden, October 12. The Electress was last Friday declared by her Physicians to be out of Danger; and this Morning Te Deum is to be sung in the Court Chapel for her Royal Highness's happy Recovery; and the Court is, on that Account, to appear this Day in great Gala.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Precentor and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. David, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Dr. Robert Lowth, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Oxford: And a Letter recommending to the said Precentor and Chapter Charles Muffs, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of St. David.
