the French have been somewhat disheartned at the fal-Jing of the new Bastions which they had with much trouble and cost raised at Haguenam, yet they continue their Works with the greatest viligence and application possible, resolving to make that Place, Saverne, and Schlestadt as strong as their sciruation is capable of. The Count of Sternberg Vice-Chancellor of Bobemia is parted from Drejden, the Elector of Saxony's residence, on his Errand to the Duke of Hanouer, &c.

Hamburg, Febr. 4. From Copenhagen they tell us, that that King has drawn together near Kroonenburg, a Body of 10 or 12000 Men, besides his Garisons; but that there are few Men in Funen, not above 1200, reckoning the five Companies of Dragoons of the Count of Ratzon; however they are very much upon their guard, and have in many places, where the ground is higher than the rest, set up pitch Barrels, which upon any appearance of the Enemy, are to be immediately fired, that by that means, the one taking the alarum from the other, the whole Island may in short time have warning for the Boors, as well as the Soldiers to put themselves in Arms. The Inhabitants of Altena have for these days past been very much affrighted, the Suedes of stade having fent out feveral Boats, with Soldiers to plunder them, but they did not put their delign into execution, hindred as is f id by the Ice.

Ditto, Febr. 7. Our Magistrates are going to send two Deputies to the Elector of Brandenburg, who hath caused the persons of the Subjects of this City, at Maegdeburgh, to be arrefled, and their Goods to be feiz-The Danes of Gluckstadt, Altena, and other plaed. ces on the Elbe, are preparing to make some attempt upon the Suedes by water, in return to what they defigned upon Altena, and to that end, are fitting up a Merchantman, used to the Greenland Trade, and will put into her 20 Guns. Here is a discourse, that the Bishop of Munster is going to make a step to Vieuna, to confer with the Emperor concerning the approaching Campagne. From Pomeren they write, that the Brandenburgs had again retaken the Island of Usedom, with the loss of 200 Suedes, and that it was believed they would proceed and attack Anclam. The Suedes Troops that belieged Wolgast are returned to their quarters at Straelfond, and the Isle of Rugen; and the Elector has supplyed the Castle with fresh stores, of Ammunition, and other necessaries. There is an Imperial Decree come out, containing, That the Crown of Sueden shall not for the future any more be called to the Dyet at Ratisbonne.

Bremen, Febr. J. Yesterday arrived here the Sieur Klingenberg, late Ambassador from the King of Denmark at the Hague, on his way to Copenhagen; the Troops of the Confederates which are quartered in this Diocess, have orders to hold themselves ready to march, which makes us believe, the defign upon Stade will now quickly be taken in hand. Here is appointed to be held within few days a meeting of the Deputies of the several Allies, in order to the agreeing what is to be done with Carelsburg (about which there feems at present some dispute) that is, to whose repartition it shall belong, and whether it shall be demolished or not; this City greatly endeavors the latter, for the concern it has, not to have a check upon its Navigation and Trade as this Fort is.

Liegel, Febr. 7, The fifth instant, the Mareschal d'Estrades marched again out of Maestricht, with sour Squadrons of Horse, and some Foot, and orders were fent for a Party to draw out of our Cittadel and to join him, this made us imagine that the design was again upon the Castle of Heers (which the Dutch have now very well fortified) but these Troops marched !

onely to Huy, for what reason we know not. poor Countrey continues to be extremely vexed by the Dutch, who are very severe with the Countrey people, that do not pay the Contributions demanded of them. The Duke of Newburg we hear proceeds with his new Levies, in order to the forming a Body of an Army, for the security of his own Countrey, against all parties that shall go about to molest them. The French Ambaffadors are still at Charleville, without receiving as yet the necessary Passports from the Hague; and here hath been a discourse, that they have been recalled to Paris, which ha h been the rather believed, for that it's faid their Excellencies have caused their Goods which were shipped in certain Vessels, in order to their transportation to Nimeguen, to be taken on shore again, though, we are this day told, that they have been shipped a second time.

Amfterdam, Febr. 11. We are now sufficiently convinced of the error of the report we had hele of the French having taken the Colony of Surinam. From Gelderland they tell us, that he Troops which upon the French besieging Heers, marched that way, are returned again to their former quatters. It is faid, that otders are given to begin to work on the Men of Wat that are to be fitted out there, to join with the Danes

in the Baltique.

The 7th instant arrived here Sir Hague, Febr. 11. Gabriel Sylvius, ient by His Majesty of Great Britain, to complement the Prince of Orange upon the death of his Grandmother the late Princess Dowager. Yesteday his Highness parted hence for Soeftdike, with intention to pass 7 or 8 dayes there in hunting. At Nimeguen are arrived feveral Domesticks of the French Ambassadors, (who are still expecting the necessary Passports at Charleville) with orders, as is faid, to prepare the houses We have not which are taken for their Excellencies. any farther account of the success of the Engagement between ours and the French Fleer on the Coast of Sicily, which we very impatiently expect. We are told of a Treaty lately concluded between the Duke of Hanouer, and the Duke of Zell and Ofnabrugh, for mutual affiftance and defence. The Letters we receive from Germamy bring nothing new: 42
