St. James's, October 25.

THIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, who entered into the Seventh Year of His Reign, there was a very numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on the Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint William-Henry Lyttelton, Esq; His Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the King of Portugal.

The following Address of the Governor, Council, and Assembly of the Province of New Hampshire in New England, has been presented to the King by the Earl of Shelburne, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Governor, Council, and Assembly of your Majesty's Province of New Hampshire in New England, humbly beg Leave, amidst the general Acclamations of this joyful Continent on the Repeal of the late Stamp-Act, to return our most dutiful and sincere Thanks to your Majesty for this eminent Proof of your Royal Benignity and Favor, of your Paternal Care and Concern for the Distresses of your faithful Subjects in this remote Part of your Dominions.

Truly sensible of that unexampled Justice and Lenity which shine throughout the Reigns of the illustrious Kings of your Royal House, this Instance of your Majesty's great Goodness and Condescension does not surprize us; but it sinks deep into our Hearts, and binds us unto your Majesty with the strongest of all Ties, those of Affection and Gratitude.

May your Majesty reign long and prosperously over a grateful People; and may there never be wanting an Heir of your Royal Virtues and Family to continue to the latest Posterity those

Blessings which the present Generation enjoy under your Majesty's happy Government.

Florence, October 7. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick arrived here on Sunday last, being attended by the Lieutenant of the Posts, whom the Great Duke had sent to Bologna to prepare Horses for him on the Road. His Highness went the same Evening incognito to the Theatre, and the next Day did Sir Horace Mann, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary here, the Honour to dine at his House with several of the Nobility. In the Afternoon his Highness went to the Palace, which the Great Duke inhabits in the Country, by whom, and the Great Dutchess, he was received with the greatest Marks of Distinction. There was a Drawing-Room at Court the same Evening, at which the Prince assisted; after which their Royal Highnesses came to the Theatre in Town. Marquis Capponi, who acts as Great Chamberlain, was sent thither to invite the Prince to dine at Court To-day.

Turin, October 11. Last Sunday his Sardinian Majesty having received an exact Account of the Quantity and Quality of all Sorts of Grain in his Dominions, published an Order, by which the Extraction of it is prohibited upon Pain of corporal Punishment.

The same Evening, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, the Dutchess of Savoy was brought to Bed of a Son, who was baptized the next Day with great Ceremony, and the Title of Count de Maurienne was conferred on him by the King of Sardinia.

Last Thursday, the 9th Instant, Cardinal Rovera di Pralorme, Archbishop of Turin, died here in the 82d Year of his Age.
