To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common Council assembled, with Hearts deeply impressed with Affection for your Majesty, beg Leave to offer our sincere Congratulations upon the interesting Events which have so recently happened.

The safe Delivery of her Majesty calls for our most grateful Acknowledgments to the Divine Being; and plainly evinces, that a Princess, like her, endowed with every natural and acquired Grace, is and always must be the peculiar and favourite Care of Providence.

Permit us, Royal Sir, with the utmost Veneration, to congratulate your Majesty on the Entrance of your Illustrious Family, by the Birth of a Princess Royal; an Event which gives your faithful Subjects and their Posterity a farther Assurance of the Preservation of our happy Constitution, and of possessing those valuable and solid Advantages they have hitherto enjoyed under the Patronage of your Majesty's August House.

The Marriage of your Royal Sister, the Princess Caroline Matilda, with his Majesty the King of Denmark, must give universal Satisfaction to your faithful Subjects, as, by promoting an Alliance with so powerful and respectable a Monarch, governed by the Principles he is, your Majesty not only demonstrates your paternal Regards for the true Interest of your People, but also your Attention to whatever may strengthen the Protestant Religion.

This ancient and loyal City, animated by a Sense of the many Royal Favours with which it has been distinguished, and of your Majesty's early and repeated Acts of Virtue, is desirous of serving your Majesty, the same Loyalty and Attachment, for which it hath hitherto been remarkable, shall be always exerted in the Defence and Support of your Majesty's Person, and Government.

*Most please our Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council, of the City of Exeter, in Cham-

ber assembled, presume to congratulate your Majesty on the auspicious Birth of a Princess; an Event not less interesting to your Majesty's domestic Happiness, than to the Welfare of your People, who derive a Security to their Laws and Liberties, from whatsoever tends to perpetuate your illustrious House.

Accept likewise, most gracious Sovereign, our sincerest and most respectful Congratulations on the Marriage of the Princess, your Royal Sister, with the King of Denmark: May this Alliance prove as productive of mutual Joy and Felicity to the Royal Pair, as it is conducive to the Maintenance and Support of the Protestant Interest in Europe.

Amidst this universal Joy and Congratulation, we should be wanting in Gratitude, if we failed to acknowledge the paternal Care, wherewith your Majesty watched over the Welfare of your People, when by a late seasonable Exertion of the Prerogative, your Majesty rescued them from all the Miseries of Famine. In consequence of the late Embargo, the Fruits of the Earth are restored to your People, who, secure in your Majesty's Protection, now taste the Blessings of Peace and Liberty, under the Reign of a Patriot Prince.

May every domestic Felicity, every publick Blessing, attend your Majesty's Reign, and render it long, prosperous, and happy.

*St. Petersburg, September 21, O. S.* Yesterday being the Birth-day of his Imperial Highness the Great Duke, who then entered into the 13th Year of his Age, was celebrated here with the usual Magnificence. At Eleven o'Clock his Imperial Highness passed into the Apartments of her Imperial Majesty, from whence he proceeded with her to the Court-Chapel, where they heard Divine Service.

At Twelve they received the Congratulations of the Foreign Ministers, Nobility, and Clergy. At One the Empress and Great Duke dined in Publick with the Nobility of both Sexes of the two first Classes. On this Occasion the Imperial Healths were drank with the loudest Acclamations, and the usual Ceremonies of firing the Cannon of the Forts and Admiralty. In the Evening was a grand Ball and Supper, at which assisted all the Foreign Ministers, and the Nobility of both Sexes of the four first Classes. The Night concluded with great Illuminations, and every other Demonstration of Joy.

*Lisbon, October 5.* His most Faithful Majesty has lately conferred on the Count d'Oeyras the Jurisdiction of the Town of Oeyras, (only the Territory about it being in a former Grant) and the Post of Alcaide Mayor, or High Bailiff of the City of Lamego.

His Britannick Majesty's Sloop the *Spy*, Captain Thomas Allwright, arrived the 30th of September from Newfoundland, and will probably be Home in a few Days.

The Expedition Packet came in this Morning in Eleven Days.

Stockholm, October 14. Hoffman has been executed here this Morning, in pursuance of the Sentence passed upon him by the Commission.

Warsaw, October 15. Count Bieliński, who for many Years has exercised the Charge of Great Marshal of the Crown, died here lately. Prince Lubomirsky, Son-in-Law of Prince Czartoriski, Palatin of Russia, is nominated to succeed him in that important Employ.

Hamburg, October 21. On Saturday the 18th Instant, the Queen of Denmark landed at Altona; and it is impossible to describe the Crowds of People, as well upon the Elbe as on the Shore, and in every Street through which her Majesty was to pass, waiting to see their Queen. The River was covered with Boats ornamented with Danish and British Colours, as were all the Ships with their respective ones, both at Altona and Hamburg. On Account of the Tide her Majesty did not get into her Barge at Haarbours till past Three o'Clock: It was a new one finely ornamented, and built by the City of Hamburg on Purpose for this Solemnity. Her Majesty's Approach to Altona was announced by the frequent Discharges of Cannon from the Ships in the River; and as soon as she came in Sight of Hamburg, that City saluted the Queen with Thirty Guns. A Quarter of an Hour before the Landing, his Excellency the Baron de Dehn, Stadtholder of the Duchies of Sleswick and Holstein, handed the Grande Maitresse Madame de Plesse, followed by the Maids of Honour, and the rest of her Majesty's Household, down to the Bridge prepared for the Royal Reception, which was covered with scarlet Cloth, on one Side whereof were ranged the Ladies, and on the other the Men, and at the End were two Rows of young Maidens dressed in White, who strewed Flowers before her Majesty as she advanced. It was past Six o'Clock when the Queen landed. The Streets were lined with the Burgers under Arms, and escorted by the Danish Cuirassiers. Her Majesty passed under a Triumphal Arch finely illuminated: Another of the same Kind was erected opposite to the Queen's House, where her Majesty being arrived, the Ladies were immediately presented to her; after which her Majesty supped in Publick. On Sunday Morning the Queen went to Church: At her Return there was a Circle, when all the Foreign Ministers here were introduced to her Majesty, as were the Deputies from the City of Hamburg. After dining in Publick, about Four of the Clock her Majesty, attended by all the Court, and by the English and Hanoverian Suite, passed through the principal Streets of Hamburg, preceded by a large Detachment of Hamburg Dragoons as well as by the Danish Troops: Her Majesty was saluted, both at her Entry and Departure, by a grand Discharge of the Cannon upon the Ramparts. The Lieutenant General, Baron De Jahnus, at the Head of the Officers, had the Honour to salute her Majesty as she passed by the Grand Guard. At her Majesty's Return to Altona, she found the City finely illuminated. Yesterday, being Monday, her Majesty had a full Court, and was graciously pleased to receive a Deputation of four Members of the Faculty, to compliment her upon her Arrival; and about Ten o'Clock the next Morning her Majesty set out to proceed on her Journey to Copenhagen.

" very soon Lock to it for by God we will  
" and you say flams is hot but hell is hotter  
" dam us if you burn without you let the boy  
" So no more from your ever lovea  
" Dam Rad."

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said threatening incendiary Letter, and in Dropping or Placing it as above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the same) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
