May the August House of Hanover still increase, and, by its Intermarriages, cement the

Protestant Interest in Europe.

The late gracious Interpolition of your Majelly's Prerogative, whereby this Nation was faved from Dearth and Famine, and all their attendant Calamities, demand our most grateful Acknowledgments. In former Times the Royal Prerogative was feldom vigoroufly exerted, but for the Purpose of Violating the Life, the Liberty, or the Property of the Subject; it was feldom felt but in its most terrible Consequences.

Now under your Majesty's most Auspicious Reign, it has relieved the Necessities of your People; it has revived the drooping Trade and Manufactures of this Kingdom, and supplied the Desects and Impersections of your Laws: May your Majesty still continue to place your this Glory in the Prosperity of your People, and make the Exercise of your Royal Power conduave to their Interests.
