**B**y the last Accounts from Cyprus, we hear, that the Castle of Cerigna was taken by the Bahaw on the 16th of August. In it were found Halile Aga, Chief of the Malecontents, and about Sixty of his Adherents. He was impaled, and his Head was sent to the Porte, with those of a Number of his Followers. The most noted of the Malecontents were afterwards executed as they were taken. Numbers of the poor infatuated Peasants, who entered into the Rebellion by Compulsion, were released after a strict Examination. Three of the Assassins of the Governor in the Year 1764, were taken, and impaled.
