By the last Accounts from Cyprus, we hear, that the Castle of Cerigna was taken by the Bahaw on the 16th of August. In it were found Halile Aga, Chief of the Malecontents, and about Sixty of his Adherents. He was impaled, and his Head was sent to the Porte, with those of a Number of his Followers. The most noted of the Malecontents were afterwards executed as they were taken. Numbers of the poor infatuated Peasants, who entered into the Rebellion by Compulsion, were released after a strict Examination. Three of the Assassins of the Governor in the Year 1764, were taken, and impaled.

“ Mr Lidington and John Kingston we find you are theds of the town and we hope that you will Consider the Dearnis of Corn for we are Goeing to Drive too Countis that is Buckingham and Northampton shears and this gives you warning for if you farmers Dont not Let Corn Be Cheper once in a fortnight your Barns and hovils shall all be in flames next ways we have Dound with one Bam at Finnmore and we will go on with it if you Dont Consider We poor Slaves of yourn we are all most Starveid and we can die but once for we have confided within ourselves that it is the farmers faults and so we will downe with them as Shure as you are a Live Downe to ashes the shall Come if you Dont alter within that Time Downe to the ground.”

to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said anonymous threatening incendiary Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact. so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof: And also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to the Person making such Discovery; to be paid by the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
