*Florence, November 22.*

ON the 15th, being the Great Duke's Name-day, it was celebrated with great Pomp. In the Morning all Ranks of the Nobility and Military Officers kissed the Great Duke and Dutches's Hands, and the Foreign Ministers paid their Respects to them on that Occasion: They afterwards dined in State; and in the Evening there was a great Drawing-Room. The Duke Salviati was that Day declared Great Chamberlain, in the room of the late Count Thurn.

Count Goes arrived that Day from Vienna, being appointed the Great Duke's Aide de Camp as Marshal, and Madame Goes his Wife was appointed Dame de Cour.

Some other Dispositions have been made that solely regard the Court; Ten Gentlemen and as many Ladies have been declared Gentilshommes et Dames de Compagnie: They both have Access at Court in the Evenings when they please, and the Gentlemen only to the Private Box at the Theatre.

A List has been published of those whose Coaches may go into the Court-Yard of the Palace: It consists of all those who are called Great Officers of the Court, the Pope's Nuncio, and the Archbishop.

The Day after To-morrow being the Great Dutches's Birth-Day, it will be celebrated in the same Manner as the 15th.

*Berlin, November 29.* Last Night his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia came to Town from Rhinsberg, and his Princess is expected here in a few Days, for the Winter Season. His Prussian Majesty continues in perfect good Health at Potzdam, where the Musicians and Comedians have been sent for, for the Amusement of her Serene Highness the Reigning Dutches of Wurtemberg, who it is believed will remain there till the Middle of next Month, when the King of Prussia is expected in Berlin.

*Hamburgh, December 2.* The Price of Flour begins to rise here, owing to the unusual Dryness of the Seaford, whereby there is a Want of Water in the Alster for the Mills: No Rain scarcely has fallen for these three Months; so that many Villages have not Water sufficient for their Cattle: A Circumstance not remembered here by the oldest Man.
