THIS Day his Grace Harry Duke of Bolton, the Right Honourable Frederick North, commonly called Lord North, and Sir Edward Hawke, Knight of the Bath, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

WHEREAS Henry Willis, of Seaton and Beer in the County of Devon, Blacksmith, and John Hatherly, of the Parish of Heavitree in the said County of Devon, Labourer, were, upon the Twenty-ninth Day of October last, charged by Information of credible Persons upon Oath by them subscribed, before Francis Drake, Clerk, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the County of Devon, with having been guilty, on or about the Ninth Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-two, of being together with divers other Persons, to the Number of ten and upwards, armed with offensive Weapons, (to wit) large loaded Whips, Clubs, and Bludgeons, and so armed, being feloniously assembled at a Place called Collaton in the Parish of Paington in the said County of Devon, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Rescuing a large Quantity of uncustomed Goods: Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Francis Drake, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, Require and Command, that the said Henry Willis and John Hatherly, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

WHEREAS James Anning otherwise Anney, and Thomas Gifford otherwise Soaper, both of the Parish of Paington in the County of Devon, Labourers, were, upon the Twenty-eighth Day of October last, charged by Information of credible Persons upon Oath by them subscribed, before Francis Drake, Clerk, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the County of Devon, with having been guilty, on or about the Nineteenth Day of April now last past, of being together with diverse other Persons, to the Number of ten and upwards, armed with offensive Weapons, (to wit) large loaded Whips, Clubs and Bludgeons, and so armed being feloniously assembled at a Place called the Old Abbey in the Parish of Heavitree in the said County of Devon, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Running, Landing, and Carrying away a large Quantity of uncustomed Goods: Which Information was afterwards Certified by the said Francis Drake, under his Hand and Seal, to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this Order in His Privy Council, Require and Command, that the said James Anning otherwise Anney, and Thomas Gifford otherwise Soaper, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.
