Stockholm, December 9.
THE grand Entertainment which the Russian Minister gave here last Wednesday, in honour of the Prince Royal's Marriage, was executed in the most splendid Manner. It began by a Supper to 260 Persons, who were served with the greatest Order imaginable: As soon as they arose from Table, they were surpris'd by a very fine Firework placed upon an Island just opposite to his House, which was illuminated with many thousand Lamps, down to the Edge of the Water, and the whole was concluded with a Ball which lasted till six o'Clock in the Morning.

Vienna, December 13. The eldest Arch-Dutchess continues indisposed: The Arch-Dukes Ferdinand and Maximilian are appointed Generals of Horse, and the Duke of Aremberg a Feldt Marshal.

Berlin, December 13. His Prussian Majesty continues still at Potzdam, and, it is now said, will not come to Berlin till the 18th, when the Carnival will immediately begin.

Dre'den, December 15. From the extraordinary Drought during the last Autumn in these Parts, Water became so scarce in Places any way remot: from the Elbe, that People have not been able to grind a sufficient Quantity of Corn into Meal for their Winter Provision, and now that the Frosts are setting in, the Elbe itself can be of little Service for that Purpose; where as a Scarcity of so necessary an Article ought already to be felt, the Administrator, to prevent the growing Evil, has taken off the Tax on several of all Kinds, and they are about to erect Wind Mills, prohibited hitherto, in favour of such as held the Water Mills in Farm.

Count Welsberg, late the Imperial Minister at Lisbon, went Yesterday to pay his Court to this Electoral Family: He is on his Way to Copenhagen, where he is to reside in Quality of Envoy Plenipotentiary from the Court of Vienna.

Berlin, December 16. Last Saturday the 13th the reigning Dutchess of Wurtemberg came from Potzdam to this City: Her Highness is lodged in the Palace, in the Apartment formerly occupied by the Prince's Amelia; and his Prussian Majesty with the rest of the Royal Family are expected here Tomorrow.

His Majesty has been pleas'd to raise Major General Saldern, Commandant of Potzdam, to the Rank of Lieutenant General, and also to ap-

point him Governor of Magdeburg, and Colonel of a Regiment.

Whitehall, December 27.

The King has been pleas'd to grant unto the Right Honourable Wills Earl of Hillsborough of the Kingdom of Ireland and Lord Harwich Baron of Harwich in the County of Essex in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and the Right Honourable Francis Baron Le Despencer, the Office of Post-master General, in the room of the Right Honourable William Earl of Besborough of the Kingdom of Ireland and Baron Ponsonby of Syonby in the County of Leicester in the Kingdom of Great Britain, and the Right Honourable Thomas Lord Grantham Baron of Grantham in the County of Lincoln.

The King has been pleas'd to constitute and appoint Alexander Udny, Richard Dauber, George Burges, and Thomas Lockart, Esqrs. together with George Brown, Esq; in the room of George Drummond, Esq; deceased, to be Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of His Majesty's Revenues of Excise in Scotland.

The King has been pleas'd to order Letters Patent to be pass'd under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, for constituting and appointing Edmond Malone, Esq; His Majesty's Second Serjeant at Law in the said Kingdom, to be one of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas in the said Kingdom, in the room of Robert Marshall, Esq;.

" To

" Alderman Hencock
" in Norwich

" As a calm goes before a storm so does the present quiet go before the ruin of this great City—I have been wicked enough—God forgive me! to swear to 16 more that are all sworn by a terrible great Oath to have a hand in it—but my Conscience tell me that to burn down so many fine houses and to make every Body beggars is not right tho' I have not so much nor so good victuals as I ought—I don't know what to do with myself for if any one tell of it the rest have dam'd their Souls to Hell by the Oath we tooke to murder him directly—and if I don't tell I can't Sleep nor eat nor be easy and must make away with myself—the 16 Men then have gott 80 baggs made of thick paper fill'd with Pitch and Brimstone ty'd up with a Salt Peter match at the mouth of them these we are to cram into Windows houses and Woodstacks the night that any one of the Prisoners is hang'd —3 of the 16 who are Lodgers are to set Fire the same Evening to their own dwellings that are thach'd and the Key holes of the Ingen houses are all of them to be fill'd up with Clay and Stones and Nails—Alderman Poole is to be knock'd down by 3 of Us with Clubs who are to enquire for him at his Doore when the Fire begins to rage—this is the Truth of the Affair and if the Court will take Care that I shant be murder'd by sending me to another place I will tell them where the 80 baggs are to be found And what night all the 16 Men are to be found in a publick house together—I shall look of the newspaper on Saturday and if I read in any part of it Mr H. desires R. S. to call on him to day I will come to you immediately—but for God's Sake remember my Danger be upon Honour and don't Let me perish for my honesty when I have told you all.
