Madrid, December 8.

**T**HE Marquis de Tavarès, Maréchal de Camp, is appointed to the Command of the Camp near Gibraltar; and the Marquis de Vanmark is removed to the supreme Council of War at Madrid.

To-morrow being the Birth-Day of the Prince of Asturias, there will be a great Gala and Belamano at this Court; on which Occasion the President of Castile gives a grand Entertainment to several Persons of the first Rank, and the Foreign Ministers; and, on the following Day, the Catholick King, accompanied by the Prince of Asturias, and the Infants Don Gabriel and Don Lewis, goes to Aranjuez, for five or six Days, to take the Diversion of Woodcock Shooting.

Turin, December 17. His Sardinian Majesty, who has been indisposed and confined to his Apartment, is now much better, and will be able to appear again at Court in a few Days.

Whitehall, December 30.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Colonel John Mompeffon to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Isle of Wight, in the room of Lieutenant-General John Stanwix, deceased.

"tooke to murder him directly—and if I don't  
"tell I can't Sleep nor eat, nor be easy and mult  
"make away with myself—the 16 Men then  
"have gott 30 baggs made of thick paper fill'd  
"with Pitch and Brimstone ty'd up with a Salt  
"Peter match at the mouth of them these we are  
"to cram into Windows houses and Woodstacks  
"the night that any one of the Prisoners is hang'd  
"—3 of the 16 who are Lodgers are to set Fire  
"the same Evening to theer own dwellings that are  
"thack'd and the Key holes of the Ingen houses  
"are all of them to be fill'd up with Clay and  
"Stones and Nails—Alderman Poole is to be  
"knock'd down by 3 of Us with Clubs who are  
"to enquire for him at his Doore when the Fire  
"begins to rage—this is the Truth of the Affair  
"and if the Court will take Care that I shant  
"be murder'd by sending me to another place I  
"will tell them where the 30 baggs are to be  
"found

" found And what night all the 16 Men are to be  
 " found in a publick house together—I shall  
 " look of the newspaper on Saturday and if I read  
 " in any part of it Mr H. desires R. S. to call on  
 " him to day I will come to you immediately—  
 " but for God's Sake remember my Danger be  
 " upon Honour and don't Let me perish for my  
 " honesty when I have told you all.
