eure it against the French Parties, who come frequent-By even under the Walls of this City, but hitherto the effect has not followed. From Vienna they write, that it had been refolved at that Court, that the first Action of the Imperial Army this next, Campagne fhould be to attack Philips burg, which the French have in the mean time taken care to furnish very plentifully with all things necessary, and to put into fuch a posture that they are in no great pain for the defigns of the Enemy upon that place. The Imperialists continue to reinforce the Garilon of Laurerburg, out of an appreheafion that the French will attack it with the opening of the Campagne, and in this confideration, they are likewife about forrifying a little Island which lies in the Rhine, opposite to Lauterburg The General Dyet of the Suiffe Cantons is concluded, without any great fatisfaction to the Imperial and Spanish Ministers, for that they have permitted the French to make newLevies in their Territories, though not the number that was defired, which has likewife not altogether pleafed the French.

Eerlin, Febr. 5: We are in great expectation to hear of the fuccels of the Enterprize which the Velt Marefchal Dorfling is gone upon, which hitherto is kept fecret. Major General Swerin is again posted in the Isle of Ufcdome, having forced the Suedes from thence the fecond time.

Hamburgh, Febr. 14. The Deputies of the Allies that met at Bremen, for the agreeing feveral matters relating to the repartition of the Conquells made in this Dioceis, upon the Suedes the last Summer, are feparated again, with intention to renew their Affembly about the middle of the next Month; it is faid, that they have adjusted the matters they met about, and that their fecond coming together will be onely to exchange the ratifications of their respective Masters of the faid agreement. The Suedes of Stade play the Masters upon the Elbe, and have demanded Conscibutions of Altena, and other places on this River. The Sieur Habeus, the Imperial Minister is still here, without having as yet, that we hear of, obtained leave of our Magistrates to put his Commission in execution, against the Sugdes that are here, or against fuch others as have not obeyed the Emperors Avocatoria ; however a Merchant and two Mafters of Veffels are in arreft, for having feat two Veffels to Stade, laden with feveral Provisions from hence, pretending that they were bound for Amsterdam. The Danes we hear are fitting out a Man of War of 24 Guns, to fecure themselves against the Suedes here on the Elbe. It is reported that the Duke of Hunauer has promised to join his Troops with those of his Brothers the Dukes of Zell and Ofnahrug, for the besieging of Stade, but it is not certain.

Liege, Febr. 14. Our Superiors have not hitheriog been, able to obtain the effect of the Treaty of free commerce granted to this Countrey by the French and Spaniard33, for it fill happens by one accident or another, that the execution is delayed. We are at prefent in this Countrey in great want of Corn, which we mult fupply our felves withal from abroad, and in that confideration, the faid liberty of Commerce is abfolutely necellary for our fubithence. The French Ambalfadors defigned for the Treaty at Nimeguen, having in vain long expected at Charlewille the Pafsports from Spain and Holland, , are from thence removed to Sedan, as fome imagine, with intention to return to Paris. Hague, Febr. 18. We hear nothing farther of the late Engagement between oursilect and that of the French, in the Miediterranean, fo that woo impatiently expect our italian Letters, to know the certainty of all. Here is a discourfe of a League faid to be concluded between the Elector of Cologne, and the bilhops of Manifur and Paderbornel, by which they blige themfelves at a common charge, to ratie an Army of 15000 Men, for their mutual defence. On Sunday laft his Highnefathe Prince of Orange returned from Soffatike. The preparations for the Campagne are haftened with all poffible diligence, and we are told his Highnefs means to be in the Field the beginning of April. To morrow the States of Holland meet. In Zealand ate fitting out a great many Privaters, and particularly fix Men of War, who are defigned for forme confiderable expedition. The Men of War that are to be joined with thole of Demmark, are in like manner fitting out.

Paris, Febr. 19. Our laft Letters from Italy brought us the confirmation of what we received by the Ordinary precepting, viz. That the French functors were artived at Miffing, and that Licutenant Admiral de Rayter was returning homewate with his Fleet, and that he was already arrived at 1 egbrne, but fome Letters add, that two or three days after the Heer de Rayter sdeparture from the Coaft of Sicily, the Marguis de Vills Franca, Viceroy of that Kingdom, had by an Exprefs received orders from the States General, to the Heer de Rayter, to continue formetime longer in those parts, which the Viceroy had with all difference dipatched after him, in hopes they might overtake him, and bring him back. We are told, that the King has given orders to add five Companies to each Regiment of Foot, and that his Majeft, has declared his intention to be in the Field by the 15 of April. We expect to hear what the Suiffe Cantons have refolved in their General Dyst, upon the demands made by the French Ambaffador, to have permitfions to raife fome thoulands of Mea.

Ditto, Febr. 21. His Majefty, in confideration of the good Services of the Count de Lorge, has been pleafed to make him a Mareschal of France. We have not any news from Isdy, fince what we told you in our last.
