

sure it against the French Parties, who come frequently even under the Walls of this City, but hitherto the effect has not followed. From Vienna they write, that it had been resolved at that Court, that the first Action of the Imperial Army this next Campagne should be to attack *Pfalzburg*, which the French have in the mean time taken care to furnish very plentifully with all things necessary, and to put into such a posture that they are in no great pain for the designs of the Enemy upon that place. The Imperialists continue to reinforce the Garrison of *Lauterburg*, out of an apprehension that the French will attack it with the opening of the Campagne, and in this consideration, they are likewise about fortifying a little Island which lies in the *Rhine*, opposite to *Lauterburg*. The General Dyet of the Suisse Cantons is concluded, without any great satisfaction to the Imperial and Spanish Ministers, for that they have permitted the French to make new Levies in their Territories, though not the number that was desired, which has likewise not altogether pleased the French.

Berlin, Febr. 5: We are in great expectation to hear of the success of the Enterprize which the Velt Marechal *Dorsing* is gone upon, which hitherto is kept secret. Major General *Swerin* is again posted in the Isle of *Usedom*, having forced the Suedes from thence the second time.

Hamburg, Febr. 14. The Deputies of the Allies that met at *Bremen*, for the agreeing several matters relating to the repartition of the Conquests made in this Diocess, upon the Suedes the last Summer, are separated again, with intention to renew their Assembly about the middle of the next Month; it is said, that they have adjusted the matters they met about, and that their second coming together will be onely to exchange the ratifications of their respective Masters of the said agreement. The Suedes of *Stade* play the Masters upon the *Elbe*, and have demanded Contributions of *Altena*, and other places on this River. The Sieur *Habeus*, the Imperial Minister is still here, without having as yet, that we hear of, obtained leave of our Magistrates to put his Commission in execution, against the Suedes that are here, or against such others as have not obeyed the Emperors Avocatoria; however a Merchant and two Masters of Vessels are in arrest, for having sent two Vessels to *Stade*, laden with several Provisions from hence, pretending that they were bound for *Amsterdam*. The Danes we hear are fitting out a Man of War of 24 Guns, to secure themselves against the Suedes here on the *Elbe*. It is reported that the Duke of *Hannover* has promised to join his Troops with those of his Brothers the Dukes of *Zell* and *Qsnabrug*, for the besieging of *Stade*, but it is not certain.

Liege, Febr. 14. Our Superiors have not hitherto been able to obtain the effect of the Treaty of free commerce granted to this Countrey by the French and Spaniards, for it still happens by one accident or another, that the execution is delayed. We are at present in this Countrey in great want of Corn, which we must supply our selves withal from abroad, and in that consideration, the said liberty of Commerce is absolutely necessary for our subsistence. The French Ambassadors designed for the Treaty at *Nimeguen*, having in vain long expected at *Charlevoille* the Passports from *Spain* and *Holland*, are from thence removed to *Sedan*, as some imagine, with intention to return to *Paris*.

Hague, Febr. 18. We hear nothing farther of the late Engagement between our Fleet and that of the French, in the *Mediterranean*, so that we impatiently expect our Italian Letters, to know the certainty of all. Here is a discourse of a League said to be concluded between the Elector of *Cologne*, and the bishops of *Munster* and *Paderborn*, by which they oblige themselves at a common charge, to raise an Army of 15000 Men, for their mutual defence. On Sunday last his Highness the Prince of *Orange* returned from *Socfdike*. The preparations for the Campagne are hastened with all possible diligence, and we are told his Highness means to be in the Field the beginning of *April*. To morrow the States of *Holland* meet. In *Zealand* are fitting out a great many Privateers, and particularly six Men of War, who are designed for some considerable expedition. The Men of War that are to be joined with those of *Denmark*, are in like manner fitting out.

Paris, Febr. 19. Our last Letters from *Italy* brought us the confirmation of what we received by the Ordinary preceding, viz. That the French succors were arrived at *Misina*, and that Lieutenant Admiral *de Ruyter* was returning homeward with his Fleet, and that he was already arrived at *Leghorne*, but some Letters add, that two or three days after the Heer *de Ruyter*'s departure from the Coast of *Sicily*, the Marquis *de Villa Franca*, Viceroy of that Kingdom, had by an Express received orders from the States General, to the Heer *de Ruyter*, to continue sometime longer in those parts, which the Viceroy had with all diligence dispatched after him, in hopes they might overtake him, and bring him back. We are told, that the King has given orders to add five Companies to each Regiment of Foot, and that his Majesty has declared his intention to be in the Field by the 15 of *April*. We expect to hear what the Suisse Cantons have resolved in their General Dyet, upon the demands made by the French Ambassador, to have permission to raise some thousands of Men.

Ditto, Febr. 21. His Majesty, in consideration of the good Services of the Count *de Loge*, has been pleased to make him a Marechal of *France*. We have not any news from *Italy*, since what we told you in our last.
