Stockholm, December 16.

COUNT Charles Gyllenborg is appointed by the King to go to Peterfbourg to notify the Prince Royal's Marriage to that Court, and sets out Tomorrow.

Dresden, December 20. Count Welsberg, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Vienna, is upon the Point of setting off from hence, to proceed on his Mission to Copenhagen.

Dresden, December 24. Yesterday having been the Elector's Birth-day, who entered into his 17th Year, the Electoral Family dined by themselves under a Canopy of State, attended by the Principal Officers of the Court; and in the Evening there was a very numerous and brilliant Assembly in the Grand Apartments, which are opened only on particular Occasions.

Berlin, December 23. Last Wednesday his Prussian Majesty, the Prince and Princess Royal of Prussia, Young Prince Henry of Prussia, and the Two Princes of Brunswick in this Service, arrived here from Potsdam. On Friday Evening the King of Prussia, and all the Royal Family, assisted at the Opera Caius Fabricius; and on Sunday his Prussian Majesty had a Levee, where he received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers residing at this Court.

Baron Edelsheim, who, during the Absence of M. de Rhode, was for some Months Interim Minister from this Court to that of Vienna, is lately come back to this Place, M. de Rhode being returned to his Station.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said anonymous, treasonable, and threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

 "to cram into Windows houses and Woodtacks
 "the night that any one of the Prisoners is hang'd
 "—3 of the 16 who are Lodgers are to set fire
 "the same Evening to their own dwellings that are
 "thatch'd and the Key holes of the Ingen houses
 "are all of them to be fill'd up with Clay and
 "stones and Nails—Alderman Poole is to be
 "knock'd down by 3 of Us with Clubs who are
 "to enquire for him at his Doore when the Fire
 "begins to rage—this is the Truth of the Affair
 "and if the Court will take Care that I shant
 "be murder'd by sending me to another place I
 "will tell them where the 80 baggs are to be
 "found And what night all the 16 Men are to be

 "in any part of it Mr H desires R. S. to call on
 "him to day I will come to you immediately—
 "but for God's Sake remember my Danger be
 "upon Honour and don't Let me perish for my
 "honesty when I have told you all.
