Madrid , Novemb. 5. Letters from Cadiz inform us, That the Armada are not in a present condition to obey their Or lers, in parting speedily to Sea; nor can the Gallions be fitted for their Voyage till about Christmas. That the French New-found-land Fleet are there arrived, bound up the Streights, being about 24 layl, with a small Convoy of 12 Gurs; and that a Spanish Min of War that formerly was much shattered in a dispute with the Turks, and so ced to put into the Canaries, is late y returned thitter, bringing in with him a F each ship as prize, being bound for Portugal.

They tell us also from Tangier, that a Ketch and another Vessel fitted out from thence as a Man of War, have lately fent in two prizes laden with Wreat, in their passage from Oran for. Cadi?; and that they have certain advice there from Teruan of a g eat defeat given to the Sante of Sally by Taffelette; by which, all the Country, except onely Arzilla, is

wholly subdued.

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Hague, Novemb. 23. On Tuessisy last the States, who fill continue their Assembly, spent some time in conferring the vacancies, both of Civil and Military charges. Yesterday they ratified the League of the late Defendive Treaty, the Vice-Chanceller Romfwinchel being returned with the Ratification of the El. Stor of Brandenburgh; and order is taken for the speedy marching of 24 Companies of Foot, and 20 Troops of Hisle towards East-Friesland. The Receiver-Gineral of Hinle towards East-Friesland. the Hecre Doubleth by reason of his age; has resigned his Office, which is not as yet dispeled of.

'Tis here confidently faid, that General Wrangle is retired from Bremen, and has made a Truce with them for three wecks; but in the mean time, has fet fuch ftrong Guards upon all the Avenues, that no forces can eafily pals from the Princes for their affithance.

Several completes are made by the Province of Zurphen to the States of their impoverishment for want of Trade; and cis believed the States cannot expect any farther Collections from them towards the defraying the expences of the War.

Letters from Bremen of the twentieth tell us, That the Treaty between the Swedes, and City of Bremen, is fully concluded 5 the conditions much the same with a former Treaty in 1654, and that their Articles were that morning fent to the Swedes Leaguer to be figned. That on Munday the Swedes are to quit four Holds belonging to the Town, all others places to be freed as soon as the Treaty can be ratified and re-

turned by his blejetly of Swedeland.

Barmick, Novemb. 18. Concerning the late Ryo. Committed ar Dumfricze, we have this account by a person that came from the place, that the Rioters were about fixicore persons, some of them having swords, and some few of them Pistols, that after they had seized on the person of Sir James Turner, they offered violence to none, only declared they would be revenged upon the person of that Tyrant (as they called him) who had laid their Family wast, and accordingly carried him away with them to a place called Maxelton, a strong House in Gallaway: that they were most of them of a place called the Glenkins, being four Parishes called Deray, Kells, Bama, Clellane, and Carsphairne, inconsiderable people, and amongst them two man sellows called the Laird of Barscob, and Laird of Corfack, neither of them worth 10 l. per annum Land, that having conveyed Sir Fames to Maxelion, the greatest pare of the Rabble disperst, leaving about twenty only in the House, we are likewise assured from Edenburgh, that upon notice of this action, the Lord A chishop of St. Andrews immediately called a Privy Councell, by whole order a very confiderable force of Horse and Foot uncer Lieutenant General Diell were appointed forthwith to march that way, who no doubt will fuddenly give a good account of the mutineers.

We are likewise informed, That day being Thursday, they

carried him two miles, to Tarangles; the next day ten miles, to Clencarne Parish; and on Saturday, to Dary in Gallaway, where, 'is said, they continue: After whem, several forces are hastning, un'er the command of the Earl of Anaudale, and Lord Dunlanrick, to reduce them to obedience, and prevent

any fa ther disturbance of the peace.
