Genoa, February 7.

M. Francis Maria Rovere having, on the 29th past, completed his Time of two Years as Doge of this Republick, the Great Council met the next Day, and nominated Fifteen Persons for one out of that Number to be elected to fill up the vacant Dignity. On the 31st the Small Council assembled, and reduced the Nomination of Fifteen to Six: And on the 3d Instant the Great Council met again, and elected M. Marcello Durazzo to fill up the vacant Dignity of Doge for two Years: Upon which Occasion the new Doge immediately received the Compliments of the Nobility of both Sexes; and will receive the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and Consuls on Monday.

Vienna, February 11. The Emperor has been pleased to dispose of the Regiments which he himself commanded, and has given the Regiment of Horse to Prince Charles Lichtenstein, and that of Foot to General Botta, Nephew to the Marshal.

The late Count Mercy's Regiment is given to General Nugent, the Imperial Minister at Berlin; and the Regiment of Infantry, vacant by the sudden Death of General O Kelly (who is much regretted as an honorable Man, and a brave Officer) to General Bulow.

The Marquis Durfort, the French Ambassador to this Court, arrived here the Middle of last Week, and on Sunday and Monday last had his first Audiences of their Imperial Majesties.

Copenhagen, February 14. Since the last Post Ten English Mails are arrived nere.

Count Welsperg, the Imperial Minister, had his Audiences on Monday last.

His Catholick Majesty has promoted M. Sperling to the Rank of Colonel.

An Ordonance has just been issued, prohibiting the Importation of Tobacco into the District of Aggerhuus in Norway, in order to encourage the Cultivation of it there, where it is thought likely to succeed very well.

Dresden, February 15. The Elector is so well recovered from his late Illness, that he has been twice this Week present at the Italian Comic Opera; and his Highness's second Brother, Prince Anthony, is likewise quite out of Danger.
