**W**E are very much surprised to see several Accounts, without the least Foundation of Truth, lately published in some of the Foreign Gazettes, relating as well to some of the Representatives of the last Diet, as to the publick Measures and Regulations which the Exigencies of the State required. The Reports, which have been inserted with regard to some private Persons need no other Refutation than their own apparent and notorious Falsity, especially as the Events spoken of have never happened. But as several Regulations, particularly relating to the Manufactures, have been represented in a less favourable Light than they deserve, there is also much Reason to apprehend, that all this has been done with a determined wicked Intention, as no Alteration has been made with regard to them, but what has been deemed proper and conducive to their Support. Thus by abolishing the Board of Manufactures, and leaving the Management of its Business to the Royal Board of Trade, nothing else has been done, than to recommit the Fund, (which was raised for the Support of the Manufactures) to the very same Persons under whose Care and Inspection it originally was; and that the Sum, saved by reducing the expensive Establishment of the aforesaid Board of Manufactures, might be employed for the Good and Encouragement of the Manufactures themselves.

Every one, within and without this Kingdom, may therefore be persuaded, that the Manufactures of Sweden, after this Time, as has been done heretofore, shall be promoted and encouraged with the utmost Care, and shall enjoy all the Rights, Privileges and Advantages, which can protect and secure the Manufactures themselves, and the Persons concerned in the Working of them.
