Cadiz, February 13.

THE Ambassador from the Emperor of Morocco, who has been here for some Time, is to embark To-morrow on Board a large Xebeque of War, for Tetuan. He is to be accompanied by Don Jorge Juan, a Rear Admiral in the Spanish Service, who goes with the Character of Ambassador from his Catholick Majesty to the Emperor.

Copenhagen, February 21. The Thaw has continued without any Interruption since the 12th, but the Sund is not yet free from Ice. Our Posts now arrive pretty regularly.

Hague, March 3. The Prince of Orange gave a grand Entertainment and Ball Yesterday Evening, at the House called the Old Court, to celebrate the Birth-day of his Sister the Princess of Nassau Weilbourg.

Brussels, March 6. This Day his Royal Highness Prince Charles, as Grand Master of the Teutonic Order, held a Chapter, and admitted, as Chevalier, M. le Comte de Rosenberg, Brother of Comte Rosenberg, who is now with the Grand Duke at Florence. The Ceremony was performed in the Chapel at Court.
