Genoa, February 21.

ARLY Yesterday Morning his Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick arrived in this City from Turin. About Half an Hour after his Arrival he was complimented by the Master of the Ceremonies in the Republick's Name, who renewed the Offer of a Deputation on Behalf of the Republick, which his Serene Highness desired, in the most polite Manner, to be excused from accepting. The Prince will embark, in a few Days, on board His Majesty's Ship Montreal, for Antibes or Toulon.

The late Earthquake has done confiderable Damage to the Houses in this City. It has been succeeded by several other Shucks not so violent as the first; and there is a constant Tremer in the Earth, selt in the City and its En-

virons.

Florence, February 21. The Great Dutchess was churched the Day before Yest rday with great Ceremony; after which she received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers. The Great Duke and Dutchess dined in State; and in the Evening they went to a Ball in Mask, in one of the Theatres. There was a Promotion that Day of Fifteen Chamberlains, hy which the whole Number now amounts to Fifty eight. The Empress has, on this Occasion, sent a Present to the Great Dutchess of eight Buttons for a Stomacher, valued at about 1000 Zechins each; and the King of Spain has sent to her Royal Highness, by the Lest Courier, a Flower for the Breast, composed of Rubies and Diamond, which was accompanied with a large Diamond in the Shape of a Heart for the young Princess, of a much greater Value.
