Dresden, March 7.

THERE was a Great Gala Wednesday last at this Court for the Elector's Name-Day. The whole Electoral Family dined under a Canopy of State, and were waited on by the Grand Officers of the Electorate; and in the Evening there was a more splendid and numerous Drawing Room than has been seen here on like Occasions, on Account of several Strangers of Distinction, who came here to divert themselves the last Days of the Carnival.

Brussels, March 13. This being the Birthday of the Emperor, there was a Grand Gala at Court. In the Morning his Royal Highness the Prince went in great State to the Church of St. Gertrude, where Te Deum was sung: Upon his Return he received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, and at One o'Clock dined in Publick, and was served by the great Officers of the Court and the Chambellans in Waiting.

As we are now in Lent there will be no Comedy or Ball.

Paris, March 15. Her Royal Highness the Dauphiness died at Versailles last Friday Night the 13th Instant, between Eight and Nine o'Clock His most Christian Majesty and all the Court retired immediately to Mass.

The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers from the 1st of July, to the 31st of December, 1766, according to His Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Office of the Treasurer of the Navy in Broad-Street, on Monday and Tuesday the 30th and 31st of this Month, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, viz. To Captains and their Attorneys, and other Officers appearing themselves, on the Monday; and to Attorneys of Lieutenants, Masters and Surgeons, on the Tuesday. (after which the Lists will be recalled once a Month) that all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable unto them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid their Half-Pay; but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to His present Majesty; and in Case any of the said Sea Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

" To John Child at the Clee
Town near the Brown Clee Hill."

" This is to Lett you know our Design that wee will put to death all that have united their Farms & cutt the years of them that occupy them & also them that have staken up their Corn, The Parliament for our relief to help to Clem us They are going to leison our Measure and Wait to the Lower Standard We are about Ten Thousand sworn and ready at any time And we wou'd have you get Arms and Cutlasses and swear one another to be true and we will Joyn you We have but one Life to Loose and we will not clem We desire you to send to the Fur Hill no more from your Brother Sufferers at present"

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in Writing the said Letter or Paper, and in Sending the same to the said John Child, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, and also a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to any one of them; (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter or Paper) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; the said Reward of One Hundred Pounds to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
