Constantinople, February 3.

ABOUT ten Days ago the Captain Pacha was deposed, and the Pacha of Romelia is named to succeed him, and the Nistangi acts till he arrives.

On the 22d past, about Eight o'Clock in the Evening, a great Fire broke out near the Grand Vizir's Palace, which consumed 100 Shops and Houses, and was not got under till it arrived at the Gate of the Vizir's Palace, and then with the greatest Difficulty, as the Wind was very high.

On Friday last, at half an Hour after Sunset, we had a very severe Shock of an Earthquake, which lasted about 15 Sec nds; and it was followed some Time after by a flight Shock, but did no Mischief.

Petersburg, March 3. This Day we received the News of the Empress's safe Arrival at Moscow on Tuesday last the 24th of February.

On Friday last the 27th of February died at Moscow, Michael Larionwitz Woronzoff, Count of the Russian Empire, Field Marshal, and formerly Great Chancellor of Russia, which Employment he resigned in April 1765.

Copenhagen, March 14. His Danish Majesty has been pleased to nominate Field Marshal Count St. Germain President of the War Directory; and Lieutenant General Gahler, Colonel Ahrenstorff, and Commissary Schultz, Members thereof, in the Room of Prince Charles of Hesse, Count Ahlefeldt, General Huth, and Colonel Firks. Count Goertz, who was lately appointed a Member of the Directory of War, and to the Command of the Horse Guard, has been removed from these Posts, but obtains the Rank of Major-General.

M. Reventiau is nominated President, and Baron Schimmelman second Deputy in the College of Commerce.

Last Week a Declaration was issued, annulling a former one, which prohibited the Importation of all Materials used in Gilting, or in the Manufacturing of Gold and Silver Lace.

The 11th of this Month her Majesty the Queen Sophia Magdalena went to Hirschholm, where she will remain a few Days.
