Westminster, April 3.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money, by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-seven.

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia, in that Part of Great-Britain called England, for One Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty seven; for the more effectually punishing Serjeants, Drummers, and Fifers, for Misbehaviour and Desertion; for securing Deserters from the Militia Regiments; and for explaining and amending so much of an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, as relates to inlisting Men into His Majesty's other Forces.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers of so much of two Acts, made in the Twelfth Year of King George the First, and in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Road from Spittlegate Hill, near Grantham, in the County of Lincoln, to Little Drayton, in the County of Nottingham, as relates to the Road leading from Fosson Bridge in the County of Lincoln, to Little Drayton, in the County of Nottingham.

An Act for repairing the Roads, from Tunbridge Wells, in the County of Kent, to Swift's Den, in the Parish of Etchingham, and from Frant, to Pessingworth Great Wood, adjoining to the Turnpike Road there, leading to Blackboys, in the County of Sussex.

An Act to explain, alter, and amend, an Act for repairing and widening several Roads, leading from between the Second and Third Mile Stone, on the Turnpike Road between the Town and County of Poole and Winborn Minster, in the County of Dorset, to Bratten Corner, in the County of Somerset; and for repairing and widening the Road, from the Turnpike Road in Brianstone, to or near a House called Fontleroy's Farm-House, in the County of Dorset.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers of so much of an Act, made in the Thirty-second Year of his late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Roads from Grantham, in the County of Lincoln, through Bottesford and Bingham, to Nottingham Trent-Bridge, and from Chappel Bar, near the West End of the Town of Nottingham,

to St. Mary's Bridge, in the Town of Derby, and from the Guide Post, in the Parish of Lenton, to Sawley Ferry, as relates to the Road leading from Grantham to Nottingham Trent-Bridge.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road, from the Turnpike Road at Hatton near the Borough of Warwick, through King's Norton in the County of Worcester, and to the upper End of Gannow Green, in the Parish of Bromsgrove, and to the Bell Inn, in the Parish of Bell Broughton, in the said County of Worcester.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act of the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for erecting and building two new Churches, and providing Burial Places, in the Town and Parish of Liverpool, in the County Palatine of Lancaster.

Stockholm, March 16. Notwithstanding due Notice has already been given to the Publick with regard to the Falseness of several defamatory Accounts published in the Foreign Gazettes, relating as well to the Regulations lately made here, as to some of His Majesty's Ministers and Subjects, it has been found that such a wicked Practice still continues: All these Accounts are therefore declared to be without the least Foundation, and of the same horrid Nature with the most criminal Libels. Such are those, which have been published, as well with regard to some private Persons, as to the pretended Ruin of the Manufactures of this Kingdom, the Decay of Commercial Credit, a supposed previous Meeting of the Diet, the Emigration of the Natives on account of their Discontents, and for Want of Support and Subsistence. But the Aim of these Reports, which is only to defame the late Regulations, and set them in a different Light from what they deserve, and to give a false Idea of the Relation, which, according to the fundamental Laws of the Constitution, subsists between the King and the States, is certainly to be looked upon as a most absurd and audacious Contrivance. The more it appears, that all such Accounts have been published with a determined wicked Design, or in Consequence of some false Reports, the less they deserve a formal Refutation. It is only sufficient to shew the World, how little they ought to be regarded.

Copenhagen, March 24. On Friday last his Danish Majesty was taken ill, and his Disorder has proved to be a Scarlet Fever, and on Sunday the Irruption appeared, but the Symptoms since then have been favourable. The Physicians are under no Apprehensions, and his Majesty is out of all Danger, Though this Disorder is infectious, the Queen has most assiduously attended his Majesty during his Illness; but happily her Majesty has hitherto escaped any ill Effect from this Instance of her great Goodness and Affection.
