Cadiz, March 13.

THE Flota from Vera Cruz and the Havana came into this Bay this Afternoon. It consists of the following Ships of War, the Santiago de Espanna, the San Carlos, and the Castilla; and of the four following Merchant Ships, the Perla, Ori-flamme, Constanza, and Almirante; the Particulars of their Cargo are not yet known.

The Triumfante from Vera Cruz, and the Portobelenna from Cartagena, were obliged to put back, being leaky, but may be expected soon.

Vienna, March 14. In Conformity to the Example set by the Emperor, the Great Duke of Tuscany and the Archdukes Ferdinand and Maximilian have given up the Regiments of which they were Proprietors, and those Regiments have been given to Generals Nostitz, Coch, and J. afgalner.

Stockholm, March 17. The Lady of Count Charles Fursen is appointed to attend the Princess Royal, upon the same Footing as the late Madame Palmfelt, only without the Title of Governante.

Gena, March 21. Yesterday in the Evening his Serene Highness the Prince of Mecklenburg Strelitz arrived here from Parma.

Lisbon, March 21. The Chevalier de Maccodnio, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Two Sicilies, had his first Audiences of their most Faithful Majesties, and the Royal Family, on Wednesday the 11th Instant, in which he delivered his Credentials.

Copenhagen, March 24. Baron Dieden set out from this Place a few Days ago for Berlin, in order to take Leave of that Court.
