Constantinople, March 2.

THE Bairam was announced, on Saturday Evening, by the Firing of Cannon from the Seraglio and the Arsenal; and Yesterday Morning the Grand Signior went to the Mosque of Sultan Achmet, which is in the Hippodrome. He came out of the Seraglio before Sun-rise, attended by all his Great Officers, and an infinite Number of Janissaries. The Cavalcade was made to the Mosque, where he staid for about half an Hour, and then returned to the Seraglio.

The Captain Pasha is arrived, and has taken Possession of his Post.

The Grand Signior has changed the Prince of Moldavia, his usual Time being expired.

Stockholm, March 24. M. Patemkein is arrived here from Petersburg, to return the Compliment made by sending Count Gyllenburg with the Notification of the Prince Royal's Marriage.

Copenhagen, March 31. Count Moltke is expected here, to assist at the approaching Coronation.

Hamburgh, April 3. M. Grofs (the new Russian Minister) has presented his Credential Letters to the Senate, and has made his Visits to the Foreign Ministers.
