Naples, Febr. 11. This afternoon artived here Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter Swith 28 fail of thips under his command; our Viceroy the Marquis de los Ver leq went off at noon with fix Gallies, and about a r mile and half from hence met him, and was on board 1 him about an hour, though during that time nothing but civilities and compliments patied between them. I Upon de Ruyters coming into Port, and upon his falue ting the place, he was answered with a more then ordinary number of Guns ; and in all other things, nothing , was wanting to express the fatisfaction people here rop ceive from his return with his Fleet into these parts. It is faid that he will not flay here above two of three days, but will then proceed towards sicily, to join the Spanish Men of War there, and to endeavor to attempt fomething upon the Erench Fleet, which fill remained at Meffina (contrary to the report which was as it feems without any ground spread abroad of its return rowards Thoulon) for the Mafter of a Veffel arrived herg yr.« fterday, which paffed the Fare, tells us, that he faw as bove 30 Capital Men of War lying in the Port of Mefe fina. Our Viceroy continues with great diligence the Levies he is making for Sicily; and we fill hope to be able with the affiliance of the Dutch Fleet to reduce the City of Messina this Summer to its former obedience.

Legborne, Febr. 22. The fatisfaction the return of Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter towards Sicily (for we have this day Letters from Naples, advising his arrival there on the 11 inflant) gives the Spaniards and those of their Party, is not less then the trouble they were in before, upon the resolution that Admiral had taken, tsken, to take his courfe directly homeward. It is faid, that the fuccors lately brought by the French Fleet into *M(ffina*, are not at all confiderable, at leaft not fo great as were expected, and as may be proportionable to the necefficies of those Inhabitants, fo that the Spaniards ferm not to doubt but they will be quickly in the fame condition, they were before the arrival of the French Fleet, if the Dutch and Spanish Fleets keep them flut up on the fide of the Sea, as it is expected they will. We have advice from *Tripoli*, that things are in great diforder there, and that those people impatiently expected the arrival of Sir John Narborough before that Port, in hopes to conclude a Peace with him.

Hanouer, Febr. 21. Our Duke has appointed a general Muster of his Traops, to be held the 20 of the of the next Month. It is confidently faid, that iome of them are to be employed in the fervice of the Emperor, but whether they are to be fent towards Staden or towards the Rhine, we do not yet know. Three perfons are lately arrived here from Liege, who are faid to be very skilful in making of Mines, but for what bufinefs we do not learn. We are told the Confederates are now wholly agreed about the repartition of the Conquests they have i and shall make upon the Suedes.

Strasburgh, Febr. 24. From Eslingen they write, that General Mantesusuli is expected back there from Vienna, about the middle of the next Month, and that he will bring with him feveral Imperial Regiments, who are at present quartered in the Hereditary Countreys, The French have lately obliged the Inhabitants of'a small Town, called Luigenstein, to take an Oath of OBedience to t em. From Meiz they tell'us, that preparations are making there for the reception of the Most Ghristian King, and that the French are hard at work on the Fortifications of that place, Nancy, and Theonville. A party of Brifac is at prefent abroad, upon fome defign. The Imperialis, who to the number of 1500, lately paffed the Rhine ar Lauterburg, having plundered fome Villages, are returned to their quarters again.

Cologne, Febr. 28. Yefterday the Marquis de Granaretunted to Bon from Coblentz, where he had been to confer with the Blector of Treves. The Duke of Newburg not onely continues his Levies in these parts, but has fent to raile two Regiments of Dragoons in his Terrivories upon the Danube. A French party of 200 Horse is at prefent abroad, and ravages the Countrey of Eyffelt. From Francfors they write, that Levies are making in all those parts, for the fervice of the Emperor; and from Mayence, that they expected there feveral fieth Troops to reinforce that Garifon. It is faid, that the Baron de Landque is to come and refide here, on the part of the Emperor.

Himburg, Febr. 28. The Confederates feem extreme intent upon the Siege of Staden, and are on all fides preparing for it. It is faid, that they are now fully agreed concerning the repartition of their Conquefts, and that the whole Dutchy of Bremen is to remain to the Dukes of Lunenburg, and the Dutchy of Ferden to the Bifhop of Munfter. From Livonia they write, that the Molcovites bigin to move towards the Frontiers of that Countrey, which gives the Suedes great jealoulies.

Braffles, March 3. From Lige we have the confirmation that the French are going to demolifh Hay and Dmans, which takes from us the apprehensions we had that they would open the Campagne in these pairs with the fiege of Namur; and gives us reason to believe, that the Enemy will come yet near-

er home, and attack fome of our Frontier places in Fland r_4 ; his Excellency therefore has reinforced all thofe Gartfons, that fo they may be able, in cale they are attacked, to make a good defence, till the Prince of Quarge may come to their relief: we are affured from the Hogue, that his Highnel's makes all the hafte poffible to come into the Field as early as the French, with an Army of above 3000 Men. Hague, March 3. The Prince of V udem nt, who hath been here to make a visit to the Prince of Orange, is returned again, on his way to Bruffels. Pon Emannel de Lyra, one of the Spinich Plenipo-tentiaries, intends, as is faid, to part hence for Nimes gues very suddend'y. As the time for Action begins now to draw near, so are our preparations haltened with the greater diligence, his Highness reforming not to lofe any time, that he may be in the Field as early as the French, at least time enough to ficure any place they may attack in the Spanish Netherlands. The thips intended for the reinforcing the Licutenant Admiral de Ruyter in the Mediterranean, wi'l be ready to fils as is faid, before the end of this Month. We have advice of the arrival of the Ambassador, sent by the States to the Czar of Moscovy at Mosco, and that he had been received with great kindnefs and refpect ; the Letters from those parts add, that great endeavors are used to enduce the Czar to make War this Spring upon the Suedes in Livonia, that hitherto he has not declared himfelf, but that in the mean time, feveral Troops march daily towards those Frontiers, which will however oblige the Suedes to hold a watchful eye on that fide, and by that means hinder them from feading feveral Troops (which might otherwife have been fpared there) to reinforce their Forces in Pomeren.

Paris, Mateb 4. It is now confidently faid at Court, that the Prince of Conde will go into the Field, and that he will command the Army in $\mathcal{A}_i/at/a$, the King refolving to be in Perfon, at leaft the beginning of the Campagne, with his Army in Flanders. We do not yet certainly know the day the King will begin his journey, but it's not doubted but it will be about the beginning of $\mathcal{A}pril$, againft which time, all things feem to be preparing. We are told that orders have been fent to Thomm and to Marfeilles, to haften the Gallies and Men of War that are fitting out there for Metfina.
