Madrid, April 2.

ON the 31st past, between Eleven and Twelve at Night, large Detachments of Troops were sent to each of the Six different Houses of Jesuits in this City; and the Doors being opened, the Bells were first secured, and a Centinel was posted at every Cell, the Occupier of which being obliged to rise, they were assembled, and the King of Spain's Commands were signified to them. In the mean Time, all the hired Coaches and Chaises at Madrid, together with a Number of Waggon, were properly distributed; and early in the Morning the Jesuits, to the Number of about Three Hundred and Fifty, were in Motion: They were allowed to carry every Necessary along with them. They took the Road to Carthagena, where they will embark for Rome. This Method will be used in all Parts of Spain, and Vessels are disposed for the same Purpose in several Ports of the Kingdom. It is assured that they are each allowed a Pension of Sixteen Pounds a Year.

Florence, April 4. Yesterday the Marquis de Barbantane had an Audience of the Great Duke and Dutchess, and presented to his Royal Highness a Letter from the most Christian King, to notify the Death of the Dauphiness.
