Barcelona, April 4.

YESTERDAY Noon the Civil and Military Power invested the Jesuits College here; and last Night an Embargo was laid on all Carriages, in which the said Jesuits are to set out, this Afternoon, well guarded, for Tarragona, where they are to be joined by all the Rest of their Fraternity in this Principality, in order to be transported to Italy in Ships of War that are expected for this Purpose.

Copenhagen, April 14. A few Days since the Wildemann, a Frigate of 18 Guns, sailed from hence with the ordinary Presents for the Emperor of Morocco.

The East-India Company's Ship the Kingdom's Wish, that was stranded on the Coast of Jutland in January last, having been refitted in this Dock, will soon sail for Bengal.

His most Serene Highness Prince Frederick of Hesse arrived here Yesterday.

Brussels, April 21. A few Days ago died here, greatly lamented by his Royal Highness, and every Body that knew him, M. le Vicomte de Nieulant, Grand Bailli de Gand, and Chambellan to their Imperial Majesties.
