Florence, April 11.
THIS Court has given Orders for a Mourning for the late Dauphiness for five Weeks, which has been notified to all the Foreign Ministers here by a Letter from Count Rosenbergh.

Marquis Balbiani, who was lately sent from the Court of Turin, to compliment the Great Duke and the Great Dutchess on the Birth of a Princess, has taken Leave of the Court Yesterday, and received a Present of a Diamond Ring by the Great Duke's Order.

The Accounts from Siena, within these few Days, are much more favourable in regard to the Epidemical Disorder that has reigned there for some Months past.

Berlin, April 18. On the 10th Instant the Reigning Dutchess of Brunswick, accompanied by her Daughter the Margravine of Bareuth, arrived at Potzdam; and Accounts are daily expected from that Place of the Princess of Prussia being brought to Bed.

The Weather continues extremely rigorous and cold, accompanied from Time to Time with Falls of Snow, which however does not prevent the daily Exercising the Soldiers both here and at Potzdam, where his Prussian Majesty frequently officiates in Person.

Dresden, April 18. Last Wednesday M. de Wurm, one of the Privy-Counsellors, and M. de Bergsdorff, Counsellor of Appeals, set out from hence for Wetzlar: The former is gone there in Quality of Envoy from the Elector of Saxony, and M. Bergsdorff accompanies him as his Coadjutor, in order to assist at the Visitation of the Imperial Chamber appointed by the Emperor, and which is to commence the 2d of next Month. The Stay of those two Gentlemen at Wetzlar will depend on the Affairs that are to be expedited there. There will probably be a great Deal of Business to be done, as there has been no Visitation since the Year 1713.

It is reported here for certain, that no Camps will be formed this Year in the Austrian Dominions; but that his Imperial Majesty will em-

ploy himself, for a good Part of the Summer, in visiting the Garrisons of Hungary, accompanied by Prince Albert of Saxony, and some intelligent Officers.

Brussels, April 24. Yesterday his Royal Highness sat out for Marrimont, where he proposes passing some Days with her Royal Highness his Sister.

On Tuesday last died here M. le Duc de Croy, Grandee of Spain of the First Class, and Knight of the Golden Fleece.
