GOD Save the KING.

Madrid, April 13. His Catholick Majesty and all his Royal Family removed on the 11th from the Pardo to the Palace in this Town.

Stockholm, April 14. M. Juel, the new Danish Minister, is arrived here.

Vienna, April 18. The Duc de St. Elizabeth, who has been long the Neapolitan Minister to this Court, has received and presented his Credentials as Ambassador Extraordinary; and is the Person appointed to make the formal Demand of the future Queen of Naples.

No Day is yet fixed for the Celebration of the Marriage; as soon as the Ceremony is performed, the Archdutchess will remove to the Belvedere, (a Palace which the Empress purchased from the Heirs of Prince Eugene) and keep a separate Court there as Queen.

Copenhagen, April 21. This being the first Day on which his Danish Majesty appeared in Publick since his late Illness, most of the Nobility, and all the Foreign Ministers, were at Court to compliment him upon the Occasion.

An Order is issued for the Court's going into Mourning To-morrow for the late Dauphiness.
