**M.** *Petersbourg, May 1.* Bauslet, the French Minister, died here about ten Days ago.

*Florence, May 23.* By the last Letters from Rome it seems as if the Pope had altered his Resolution with regard to the Admission of the Jesuits into his State.

*Lisbon, May 25.* The Ceremony of the Christening of the new-born Son of her Royal Highness the Princess of Brazil was performed Yesterday at the Royal Palace of N. S. d'Ajuda, in the Presence of their most Faithful Majesties; and was baptized by the Names of John-Maria-Joseph-Lewis-Francis-Xavier de Paula-Dominick. The Sponsors, by Proxy, were, the Empress Queen and the most Christian King. Her Royal Highness goes on extremely well in her Recovery.

*Berlin, May 30.* The King of Prussia sat out from Charlottenbourg on the 25th, for Landeborg, in order to review three Regiments of Dragoons, viz. Czetriz, Zastrow, and Albenleben, which are quartered in that Neighbourhood; and from whence he was to proceed to Stargard in Pomerania, to review Five Regiments of Infantry and Four of Cavalry, Dragoons and Hussars, purposely assembled at that Place.

On the 27th Instant, in the Morning, an Express arrived here from Protzen, (a Country-Seat belonging to Madame de Kleist) where Young Prince Henry lay ill of the Small-Pox, with the melancholy News, that that Prince died on the 26th, at Eight at Night; some dangerous Symptoms having appeared the Day before. As his Royal Highness was imagined to be out of all Danger, this Accident, being unexpected, was the more severe; nor is it possible to describe the Affliction of the whole Family, or the general Consternation it occasions here, as that Prince was extremely beloved.

Last Monday the 25th, the reigning Duke and Dutchess of Brunswick sat out from Potsdam for Brunswick, the Princess Royal being in a fair Way of Recovery.

*Hague, June 5.* Yesterday being the Anniversary of the King of Great Britain's Birthday, Sir Joseph Yorke, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary, received the Compliments of the Deputies of the States, the Foreign Ministers, and the Nobility and Gentry of the Country: In the Evening his Excellency gave a Ball and Supper upon the Occasion; at which assisted his Serene Highness the Prince Stadtholder, the Princes of Waldeck and Weilbourg, and a great Number of Persons of Di-

stinction of both Sexes. The Company did not separate till late this Morning.

M. de Larrey, Privy Counsellor and Secretary to the Prince of Orange, sets out for Berlin To-morrow, in order to settle every Thing relative to the Marriage of his Serene Highness with the Princess Wilhelmina, Sister to the Prince Royal of Prussia.
