Aranjuez, May 25.

DON John de Villalba, who lately returned from Mexico, whither he went with the Command of the Forces, is appointed Captain-General of Andalusia, of which Province he was already Commandant.

The Baron de Friesendorff, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Sweden, arrived here last Week, and has had all his Audiences of the Royal Family.

Vienna, May 30. The Empress Consort died on Thursday Morning about Nine o'Clock. The Small-Pox was of so very malevolent a Kind, that from the first Moment there was scarce a Glimpse of Hope. She herself was soon acquainted with the Danger, and met it with the most exemplary Piety, Patience, Resignation, and Fortitude. Her Death was very easy, without Struggle or Convulsion, so that those about her scarce knew when she expired. All the Imperial Family, and the whole Court, are under the greatest Affliction on this melancholy Occasion.

The Empress-Queen continues in as fair a Way as possible. Though the Eruption proved more copious than was at first imagined, it is certain that the Small-Pox is of the best Sort.

Florence, May 30. The first and second Convoy of Jesuits from Spain having been refused to land at Civita Vecchia, they sailed from thence towards Corsica, where the Republick of Genoa had consented that a certain Number of them should be distributed in the Places that are garrisoned by the French Troops: But, by the last Letters received here from Genoa, we here, that M. de Maibœuf, the Commander in Chief of those Troops in that Island, had declared, that he could not permit the Jesuits to land there; and that the Republick had likewise made the same Declaration in regard to their Landing in any Part of that State on the Continent; and that Notice thereof had been dispatched by a Vessel, to meet those Convoys at Sea.

Thursday last being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth-Day, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks:

At Noon there was a very numerous Concourse of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, at the Castle, who appeared in extraordinary Splendor, to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Justices upon the Occasion, before whom an Ode was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies: And the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
