Florence, June 6.

ON Wednesday the 2d Instant a Bark arrived at Leghorn with two Corsican Officers on board from Capraia, with an Account of the Surrender of the Fortrefs of that little Island to the Corsicans on the 28th past, after a Blockade of an Hundred and two Days: The Garrison, which consisted of thirty Soldiers and two or three Officers, had for many Days lived upon a small Portion of Bread and Water; so that they were all much extenuated: They were treated with the greatest Humanity by the Corsican Officers, and were permitted by their Capitulation to go to Genoa. Among the other Things that were found in the Fortrefs, there were four Pieces of Brass Battery Cannon and seven smaller Pieces, with a large Quantity of Bullets, Powder, and other Military Stores. Three Hundred Corsicans have been left in Garrison there: The rest were immediately sent back to Corsica.

Copenhagen, June 9. His Danish Majesty proposes setting out Tomorrow Morning for Holstein. He will reach Skewick on the 15th, Altona the 1st of July, and Trauendahl the 9th, where he will remain till the 20th. His Return hither is fixed for the 29th. All the Members of the Council will accompany him. Her Danish Majesty intends removing to Fredericksburg on Saturday next, where she will remain until the Return of his Majesty.

Vienna, June 10. It is impossible to describe the universal Joy and Satisfaction which is expressed by all Ranks of People at the Assurances now given of the Empress Queen's being out of all Danger. Her Imperial Majesty, who has been with the greatest Pleasure the general Anxiety for her Safety, has spoke of it in Terms, which shew the Impression it has made; and the Emperor, whose Behaviour upon this, as indeed upon every other Occasion, shews him to be one of the best of Sons, joins very heartily and sincerely in the general Rejoicings on this happy Event.

Hamburgh, June 12. On the 8th Instant her most Serene Highness the Princess of Anhalt-Cöthen was safely brought to Bed of a Princess.

Berlin, June 13. His Prussian Majesty, having finished his Reviews at Korb-litz near Mitleburgh, returned on the 8th to Potzdam.

Brussels, June 19. Yesterday, upon the Arrival of a special Messenger from Vienna, the Cannon upon the Ramparts were fired, and Te Deum sung in the Chapel of the Court, for the Recovery of the Dowager Empress Queen. On Sunday next there will be great Gala at Court; the Mourning to be laid aside for that Day; and his Royal Highness will go in State to hear Te Deum sung in the Cathedral of St. Gedeule.
